DEWEY TO CENTER CLOSING CAMPAIGN ON FIVE STATES

Albany, Oct. 12.—(U.P.)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey will spend most of the closing days of his campaign for the presidency in five states whose 119 electoral votes may become the deciding factor in the November elections, it was disclosed today.

Despite pleas for personal appearances and major political speeches in widely separated sections of the country, the G. O. P. candidate for president has decided to concentrate on New York, Illinois, Missouri, Massachusetts and Minnesota. President Roosevelt carried those states in the 1940 elections against the late Wendell L. Willkie.

Dewey plans to confer on details of the final campaign drive with Republican National Chairman Herbert Brownell, Jr., today while he is in New York City reviewing the Columbus day parade. Brownell, it was reported, may urge the governor to take another personal appearance in Pennsylvania, possibly Pittsburgh, in an effort to win that state's 35 electoral ballots.

The shop will be located at 111 North Central avenue and the building is now being remodeled and redecorated.

Since the opening depends upon the time when merchandise can be secured, opening date of the business will be announced later. The Puruckers state that manufacturers are now

starting to manufacture pianos and other musical instruments again and that limited supplies have been assured for the middle of November or December 1.

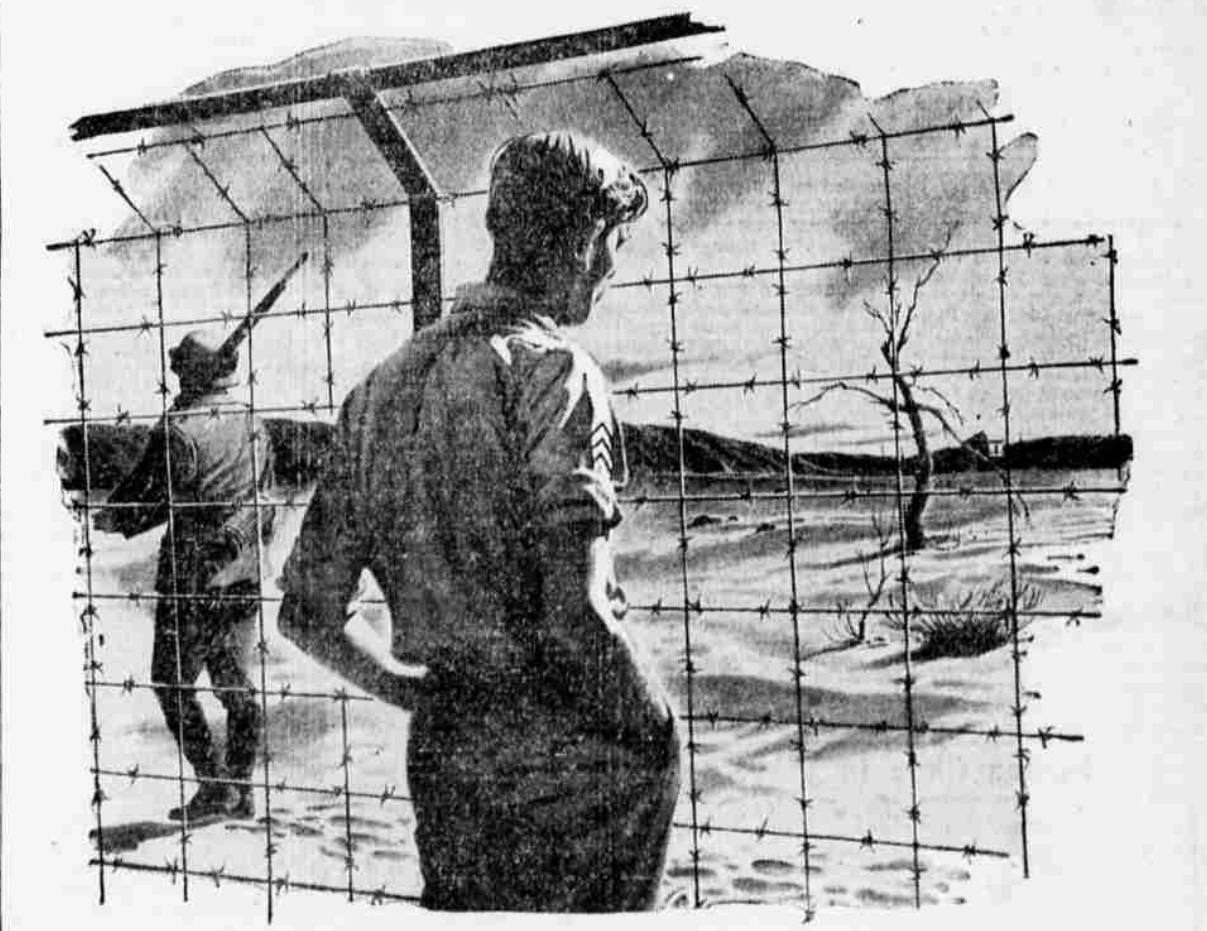
