TRUMAN ARRIVES IN L. A. SUNDAY

Aboard Truman's Campaign Train, Oct. 13.—(U.P.)—Sen. Harry S. Truman, Democratic vice-presidential nominee rolled west across Texas today on the first leg of the avowedly political part of his swing around the country.
He will arrive Sunday morning at Los Angeles where he will discuss reconversion Monday night in the first campaign address of his current tour. He scheduled platform appearances at Houston, San Antonio and El Paso.
He entrained late last night at New Orleans where he had spent three days and attended the Mississippi Valley Association. In two addresses yesterday he said food control should be given first priority among postwar public works projects and urged using the experience of the Tennessee Valley Authority as a guide for developing other river valleys particularly in Missouri.

Female Negroes Gabble While Fire Crackles

Tillicum, Wash., Oct. 13.—(U.P.)—Flames raged merrily through a Tillicum building while two unidentified female Negroes held a lengthy debate over which fire department to call.
One woman held out for the brigade in near-by Tacoma, while the opposition contended that the matter should be handled by the local blaze-busters. The first woman overrode her opponent's veto and called the Tacoma department.
"Sorry," the fire truck dispatcher answered. "That's outside our territory."
The second woman stepped smugly to the phone and summoned the district fire engine, which arrived forthwith.

Chicago, Oct. 13.—(U.P.)—Harry V. Hogans, 54, wealthy lumber firm executive, shot himself to death in his hotel room last night while his sweetheart who refused to marry him listened over the telephone.
Mrs. Jeanette Tees, 38, told police that Hogans telephoned her and threatened to kill himself if she refused to marry him.
"People who threaten to kill themselves seldom do," she said she replied.
"They don't?" Hogans said.
"Listen to this!"
She heard a loud report, she said, and called the hotel to send a bellboy to his room. The bellboy found his body stretched across the bed with a revolver in one hand and the telephone in the other.

TULE LAKE PRISONERS PROTEST AGITATION

Newell, Cal., Oct. 13.—(U.P.)—Crop harvesting by 425 enemy soldiers interned at the Tule Lake prisoner of war camp was scheduled to be resumed today after a one-day work stoppage was settled by war department representatives and growers, it was announced last night.
The prisoners, not Japanese had protested against working because of Nazi and Fascist agitation within the camp, grower representatives said.

Chicago—(U.P.)—"Too much make-up, too much jewelry, too many furs, and those huge flowers they wear. Some of them look like a well-kept grave," is the way Henri de Chatillon, Parisian fashion designer, described American women, as he stopped here enroute to Mexico City.
He believes, however, that the American woman is the most beautiful of all in face and in form. But "she does not wear her beauty well, except for a chic few." Her dress should be shorter, with softer lines, and more feminine appeal. Her hats, according to Henri, are atrocious.

Slacks made de Chatillon feel "sick all over—and positively livid with shame."
There was nothing drab about Henri as he talked about women's fashions, wearing a pink shirt, wine-red tie, and navy blue suit, and with a brilliant fuscia hat streaked with purple blue lying on the dresser.
De Chatillon favors simple, graceful gowns with broad tails to shade the face. "Even a young face gains if it is shaded a little," he said. "That horrible off-the-face hat is passing away forever, thank goodness. It was just too revolting!"

The men in America are entirely too conventional for Henri, who would like to see collarless shirts, lapelless coats and brighter colors in suitings—even pink or baby blue, which, he said, "I could wear with perfect insouciance, so long as the whole ensemble is harmonious."
