Jacksonville, Oct. 14—Jacksonville Redskins in their first six-man football encounter were victorious over Phoenix at Jacksonville Friday, despite it being Friday the 13th the Redskins ran up a score 43 to 13.

The Redskins scored three times in the first quarter, twice in the second and once in the remaining two quarters. The Jacksonville team was sparked by Max Killingsworth, Wesley Grinstead, Elvis Offenbacher and Noll Meyer. Outstanding defense was shown by Paul Henspeter.

The game was marked by good sportsmanship on both teams. Jacksonville will meet Gold Hill Friday, Oct. 20, at Gold Hill and Rogue River the following week.

ARMY HANDS PITT ALL TIME DEFEAT, NAVY BEATS DUKE

West Point, N. Y., Oct. 14—(U.P.)—A bruising Army football team repaid Pittsburgh with interest for three beatings suffered during Pitt's golden gridiron years, handing the bedraggled Panthers their worst defeat of all time, 69 to 7 today.

Three times back in the 30s the fabled Panthers had harnessed the Army mule and the men from the point had not forgotten. Husky Felix Blanchard, a human tank from Bishopville, S. C., and fleetfooted Dobbs from Frederick, Okla., paced the cadet attack with two touchdowns each as the West Pointers buried Pitt under an avalanche of nine touchdowns and eight extra points by accurate Dick Walterhouse of Washtenaw, Mich.

Army, which previously had beaten North Carolina and Brown, allowed the Panthers their only tally in the last period against the cadet reserves. Baltimore, Mr., Oct. 14—(U.P.) Triple-threat Hal Hamberg, 150 pounds of football TNT, waved his right arm like a magic wand today and passed Navy to a hard-earned 7-to-0 victory over a never-say-die band of Duke Blue Devils.

The payoff came in the second period after both lines had fought to a savage stand-off. Hamberg entered the game at the start of the second frame. He boomed a 45-yard punt which Duke's Davis fumbled on his goal line, but recovered and brought out to the six. Duke was forced to punt. Hamberg returned it 15 yards to Duke's 45. Here, Navy discovered a weakness in the Duke line and exploited it. Scott moved to the 33 on three plays and Hamberg carried to the 16 on three more. After Navy had been set back 10 yards—five on a penalty—Hamberg rifled a pass to Guy, who took the toss on the 10, worked out of a trap and raced over.

PACIFIC BEATEN BY BEARS, 14-0

Memorial Coliseum, Berkeley, Calif., Oct. 14—(U.P.)—Held at bay by a fighting band of College of Pacific gridirers when the ball was within scoring territory, the University of California Bears counted twice from near mid-field here today to defeat the Tigers, 14-0. The victory preserved the Bears undefeated record.

The two touchdowns that brought defeat for Coach Amos Alonzo Stagg's eleven, which was gunning for its third consecutive win over California, came in the first and final quarters.

RAMBLING IRISH WAX DARTMOUTH

Boston, Oct. 14—(U.P.)—The Rambling Irish of Notre Dame made their first football trip to Boston a never-to-be-forgotten one today, handing Dartmouth's badly outclassed Indians a 64-to-0 beating before 41,000 fans at Fenway park. It was the worst football defeat Dartmouth has suffered in 60 years of competition.

Not since 1884 when Yale administered a 113-0 beating to a team of gridiron novices has Dartmouth been crushed so completely. In the opening period Notre Dame scored once. In the second period they scored four times. In the third once and in the fourth four more.

The first quarter went scoreless, but Tulane got the wave rolling in the second period when Dub Jones took a Rice kick on the 45, running it back to the 37. Columbia loses to Yale 27 to 10. New Haven, Oct. 14—(U.P.)—George Barksdale, the "Arkansas Traveler" from Little Rock, and sparkplug of the Yale backfield, made two touchdowns and contributed a 56-yard run to another in a 27 to 10 victory over the Columbia Lions today before a crowd of 10,000.

Wayne Morgan, Columbia's flighty fullback, made all of his team's points, kicking a field goal in the first period, and adding a touchdown and conversion kick in the final period.

HUSKIES WALLOP FEEBLE WHITMAN

Walla Walla, Wash., Oct. 14—(U.P.)—The University of Washington Huskies, readying for next week's first clash with U. S. C., scored a merciless 71-0 victory over the Whitman Missionaries today, devoting the entire third quarter to trying out guinea pig style, their overhauled kicking department. Using line plays exclusively until the third period, Washington's decourtesy was top scorer with four touchdowns. He ran up three in the second quarter.

ILLINI, MICHIGAN, IOWA PRE-FLIGHT ALL SCORE WINS

Champaign, Ill., Oct. 14—(U.P.)—Claude (Buddy) Young, collegiate football's fastest runner, reached top speed at the expense of the University of Iowa today to lead Illinois to a 40-to-6 victory over the Iowans before a crowd of 11,494.

Young, national sprint champion, carried the ball for Illinois only seven times, but he gained 139 yards, an average of nearly 20 for every time he carried the ball, scored two Illinois touchdowns and set up a third. Ann Arbor, Mich., Oct. 14—(U.P.)—The Michigan football team went over, around and through a hapless Northwestern eleven today for a 27-to-0 victory which kept alive its hopes for retention of its big-ten title.

Madison, Wis., Oct. 14—(U.P.)—Ohio State used all of its vaunted power and aerial strength here today to overcome outclassed but fighting Wisconsin, 20 to 7, and win its third straight football game of the season before 40,000 fans at Camp Randall stadium.

OKLAHOMA LOSES TO TEXAS 20 TO 0

Lafayette, Ind., Oct. 14—(U.P.)—Iowa Pre-flight's hard-punching footballers turned two breaks into touchdowns today to defeat Purdue's co-defenders of the big ten championship, 13 to 6, in perfect fall weather. Ames, Ia., Oct. 14—(U.P.)—Iowa State college opened its bid for big six conference honors, trouncing Kansas University, 25 to 0, here today. It was the third straight cyclone victory.

JUNIORS HANDED 20-0 TROUNCING

Medford junior high football team took another trouncing Saturday afternoon when Klamath juniors defeated the Medford Juniors, 25 to 0, at the local stadium. Klamath displayed a fast backfield and scored in the first three quarters, converting on the second touchdown. Both teams used the "T" formation, but Medford was outlashed by the fast Klamath eleven who were led by their quarterback. Medford will move to Grants Pass Saturday, October 21, where they will play the junior high team.

Wes Hartley returning the kick-off 70 yards for a touchdown. Talent converted, making the score 7-6 at the half in their favor.

Beginning the second half. Wes Hartley again ran the ball over from the six-yard line after a march from the Talent 40. Bob Frink, fullback, began a touchdown parade by intercepting a Prospect pass, running 60 yards for Talent's third touchdown. Two more touchdowns were scored in the fourth quarter by Frink in the closing minutes of the game.

Aside from those three scoring attacks, the two teams battled on comparatively even terms. The sharpshooting aerials of Texas' Bobby Layne and Maxie Bell represented the margin over Oklahoma's Derald Lebow, Charley Heard and company. Tough breaks kept Coach Dana X. Bible's team from scoring at least two other touchdowns.

PENN JUVENILES TAKE 3 STRAIGHT

Philadelphia, Oct. 14—(U.P.)—Penn's jolting juveniles scored touchdowns with almost clock-like regularity, lived up to all expectations today, walloping William and Mary, 46-0, for their third straight win at Franklin field. A crowd of 32,000 saw Penn tally once in the opening period, twice in the second quarter, three times in the third period and once again in the final quarter to hand the civilian southern team its first defeat in three starts.

COLORADO WINS OVER UTAH, 26-0

Salt Lake City, Oct. 14—(U.P.)—The Golden Buffaloes of the University of Colorado today crossed the Rocky mountains to trounce their traditional rivals of the University of Utah, 26 to 0, before 8,000 fans in Ute stadium here. Colorado has a mostly-navy squad, Utah is all civilian.

Led by Halfback Dick Morrow, the Colorado team struck twice in the second quarter and twice more in the final period to run up the overwhelming victory. Several gallant goalline stands by Utah was all that kept the Coloradans from a large score.

GREAT LAKES IN SPEEDY VICTORY

Great Lakes, Ill., Oct. 14—(U.P.)—Great Lakes shifted into high gear in the third period today to roll over Western Michigan 38 to 0 before a crowd of 25,000 bluejackets. Coach Lt. Paul Brown's precise T-formation plays split the out-manned collegiate team's defense wide open after a slow first half and the sailors racked up three quick touchdowns in the opening minutes of the second half to ice the game they dominated from the opening kickoff.

ENEMY BASES IN MOLUCCAS RAKED

Allied Headquarters, Southwest Pacific, Sunday, Oct. 15—(U.P.)—More than 125 allied bombers and fighters dropped 130 tons of bombs on Amboina and Ceram islands in the southern Moluccas Thursday and Friday in a concentrated attack against enemy airdromes, Gen.

Douglas MacArthur announced today. Airdromes were "hit hard" in the two-day attack the communique said, and oil storage tanks at Boela, on the northern coast of Ceram, were set afire in the damaging attacks.
