SOLDIERS IN INDIA SAY ENTERTAINERS PASSING THEM UP

Sgt. Roger J. Headlee, stationed in Assam, India, with the China-Burma-India command, has written friends here concerning that section of the theater of war, which never sees entertainment of any kind with the exception of mail call and work. According to Headlee the rains are heavy and the cloud formations beyond description. Headlee's letter follows in part:

"Here at A P O, Assam, India, we have a problem that I believe will interest the folks at home. In the line of entertainment things are a bit dull and when the letter writing, reading and such are finished and no longer hold our interest we look for something else to pass the time.

"Then out of a rainy sky comes an announcement that some of our Hollywood friends will pay us a visit to help boost morale—we talk of the coming event, count days to see if we will be scheduled to work that night, and generally plan for their coming, hoping it won't rain too hard.

"But time passes and nothing is seen or heard of them. It finally comes out that she got sick, he remembered a previous engagement back in North Africa, or some such Hollywood excuse. So we never see them and have given up hope of ever seeing our Hollywood friends up here where it just begins to

get tough or 'too rough' as Miss Sheridan said.

"Here are some figures from the editorial (Sept. 28 issue of CHI Roundup) on the agreements entered into by our Hollywood friends who give so much to 'our boys' and 'the war effort': Joel McCrea billed for 60 days got as far as Cairo and heard that 'CBI was tough'; Paulette Goddard and Co., 54 days out of a promised 60; Joe Brown, 120 days, they played 37 and decamped.

"This doesn't apply to the real trouper that came and stayed over their time, but it is facts about some of the big names that many of us help support and at one time enjoyed seeing in a show.

"We think it is tough here also and didn't travel by air on our trip over."

Headlee was employed by the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company here prior to his entrance in the armed service. His wife, Mrs. Mary Jane Headlee, resides at Central Point with her mother, Mrs. Beebe.
