

HUNTERS KILLING APPLGATE STOCK

Stockmen of the Applegate district, report deer hunters have killed at least two steers on the range and the ranchers fear there may be more losses. The stockmen do not know whether the known dead steers were killed by design or accident.

Edwin Kubll of the Applegate reports there has always been close co-operation between stockmen of that area and hunters and he is loath to believe the killings were on purpose.

Deer often feed with cattle at night. There have been reports of "spot light" hunters in the section, and they may have killed the steers in mistake for deer at night, stockmen say.
