

DEWEY PROMISES HOUSE CLEANING IF HE'S ELECTED

Will Restore Harmony In Congress and Cooperation Between Branches

Milwaukee, Oct. 25.—(UP)—Republican presidential nominee Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, in a speech to an outdoor crowd of about 6,000 people, promised today that if he is inaugurated as president, there will be "the largest and finest house cleaning there ever was" in Washington.

Dewey said he would restore harmony in congress and cooperation between the executive office and congress.

Will Hasten Victory
"A change of administration will not interfere with the progress of the war, it will hasten victory and the conclusion of a just peace," Dewey told his audience in a brief address before leaving for Chicago.

He said it was his intention to eliminate the confusing number of boards, bureaus and departments with which labor is obliged to deal at Washington.

"Never once after Jan. 20, 1945, will I use the office of president to divide one group of the American people from another," Dewey promised. "All the new deal can offer you is four more years of the new deal and that isn't enough."

Policy Clear
The Republican presidential candidate told a news conference in Milwaukee where he stopped en route from Minneapolis to Chicago for a three hour series of conferences that he believes his own position on foreign policy as outlined in three major speeches is clear and does not require any interpretation. He will deliver another major address at Chicago tonight.

Asked whether or not there was any agreement between himself and President Roosevelt on the authority to be accorded an American representative in the United Nations' deliberations Dewey said he would leave any interpretations of Mr. Roosevelt's position to others.

"Conference Scuttled"
Dewey, charged in his Minneapolis speech last night that President Roosevelt "deliberately scuttled" the 1933 London economic conference and there-by committed "the most isolationist action ever taken by an American president."

Questioned about it at his press conference today, the GOP candidate replied:
"This is correct. I think the president's position has changed greatly in the last few years. I'm sure he favors international cooperation today."

Commenting on the re-election campaign of U. S. Sen. Alexander Wiley, R., Wis., whom Democrats have branded an isolationist, Dewey said he favored election of all candidates on the Republican ticket who are men of good will and believe in the principles of the party as espoused in the platform.

He then was asked whether he had changed his opinion of Rep. Hamilton Fish, R., New York, whose renomination he opposed this year and Dewey said, "When I have changed my opinion I'll let you know."

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Brougner Declares Religion, Science Not In Conflict

Dr. Russell M. Brougner, evangelist from New York City is preaching each evening except Saturday at the First Baptist church. The services begin at 7:30. Tonight he will preach on "The Greatest Power in the World" and he will also show colored moving pictures of Bryce Canyon.

Last night at his sermon "The Scientific Accuracy of the Bible" Dr. Brougner said, "There is no conflict between true science and Christianity, for the God who created the world in which we live also inspired holy men of old to put into writing the Scriptures. There may be occasional conflict between scientists and religionists, but none between real science and religion. The Bible was not intended to be a scientific text book but a guide to moral and spiritual development."
