

ELLSWORTH GIVES TALK ON RECENT TRIP TO EUROPE

Congressman Tells Junior High Students of Experiences in Visit to Front.

Congressman Harris Ellsworth, Republican candidate for re-election, arrived in Medford today where he will remain until Friday night. He will return Tuesday to speak before the Rotary club and will speak at the Teachers Institute in Ashland on November 3.

Introduced by Principal Glenn Linn, Ellsworth spoke at junior high school at 1 o'clock this afternoon, on his trip to the European war front.

Goes to Europe
The congressman was one of a group of ten members of the house of representatives who made the trip across the Atlantic in a flying boat operated by the British Overseas Transportation company. Leaving the United States September 9, the group arrived in Ireland and went from there to London by train and boat. He described the terrible devastation in London, where in almost every block a bomb had struck at some time during the war. Most destructive, he said, are the buzz-bombs, "the most terrible and hideous thing ever devised by man." These bombs, the speaker said, are not devised as a military weapon, but designed for the destruction of civilians. He gave as his opinion that these buzz-bombs are something the British people will remember for a long time.

Ellsworth told of hearing at least two of these bombs each day he was in London and described the sound of their approach and explosion.

Visits France
After ten days in England, the party was invited by Gen. Eisenhower to visit the beaches and operations of the American forces in France. The scenes at the "Omaha" and "Utah" beaches were, to the congressman, the highlight of the entire trip. He told of seeing the cliff where the Rangers climbed to wipe out German gun emplacements. From one cliff still dangled a rope ladder, shot there from a mortar, on the end of which an anchor slowly opened like an umbrella to attach itself to the cliff.

Ellsworth told of the pride shown by both army and navy commanders in the men of the two services who are working together as one service.

From Cherbourg, where the Germans made every effort to destroy the port, more supplies were brought in than anyone thought possible. Congressman

Ellsworth told of the Red Ball supply highway which can carry supplies from the port to the front in two and a half days.

Lauds Eisenhower
He described Gen. Eisenhower as "one of the world's greatest men."

In Paris the congressmen were taken into the war room, the walls of which were completely lined with charts and maps of the battlefronts. Surgeon General Haley told them that 90 per cent of the wounded men who get medical attention fully recover.

Outcome of War
In answer to the often-asked question about the end of the war, Ellsworth said that he has reached two conclusions: There is no doubt as to the outcome of the war for the Germans cannot muster enough strength to withstand the force of the Allied thrust. The congressman said that he saw no possibility of the end of the war before the first of the year, although the precision bombing of the present weeks may have hit a vital life-line that could stop the war much sooner.
