BLACK TORNADO TOPS SOUTHERN OREGON LEAGUE

Medford Rout Grants Pass Cavemen 41-0 To Take Conference Championship

Medford high's Black Tornado annexed the Southern Oregon conference football championship last night and advanced another notch toward the district 2 title when they defeated

Grants Pass Cavemen 41 to 0 on the local turf.
 Medford still has Ashland to play, at Ashland on Armistice day, but a loss would still give Medford the league leadership and tie Ashland with Klamath Falls for second place.

It was Medford's game from the beginning with their heavy line and speedy backs showing superiority in all departments.

Medford Kicks Off
 Medford started the game with Bob Watson kicking off out of bounds on the Grants Pass 40 yard line. Alternating the use of Lutz and Moser, Grants Pass made a first down and then were forced to kick, Robertson booting the ball into the end zone.

The Tornado took over on their own 20 and a reverse from Watson to Marvin Doty was good for 25 yards. Glenn Bostwick picked up four yards, Doty five, and then Bostwick broke through tackle for 30 yards. Here Grants Pass recovered a pass fumbled by Barnhart.

Bostwick Scores
 Moser picked up a yard and then Cahill broke through and recovered the ball when it was fumbled on a reverse from Lutz to Moser. On the third play, Bostwick crashed through the line to cross the goal for the first tally of the game. Watson's kick for placement split the uprights and Medford was out in front 7 to 0.

Lutz returned Watson's kick-off 34 yards but the Cavemen were forced to kick with Robertson sending the ball to the Medford 44.

Riggs Hits Pay Dirt
 On the third play Watson sent a long pass to Riggs who crossed untouched into the end zone just as the first period ended. Watson again made the kick from placement and Medford led 14 to 0.

Watson again kicked off deep into Caveman territory and Phippen fired a pass to Riebel which was good for 26 yards. Grants Pass tried two more plays and then Cahill intercepted a pass from Phippen on the mid-field stripe and was stopped in his tracks. Medford drew a five-yard penalty for too much time out and on the next play Barnhart took a reverse from Watson and galloped 55 yards into the end zone. Again Bob Watson kicked the extra point.

Grants Pass took the kick-off but was soon forced to punt and Medford again went into a scoring drive. This time it was Watson who skirted his own left end and streaked 10 yards to reach pay dirt. His kick for the extra point was blocked.

Reserves Play
 Coach A. Simpson then made several changes in the Medford lineup. Here Grants Pass opened up with a series of passes from Everton to Roley, most of them good for short gains, but Hunter, a Tornado reserve half-back, intercepted one of them on the Caveman 40 and outran everybody to reach the end zone just as the half ended. Watson's kick was good and the Tornado led 34 to 0.

Most of the third period was played within the respective 20 yard lines with no serious threats on the part of either team.

As the final period started, Medford had possession and Bostwick made 13 yards to take the ball to the four-yard line. Grants Pass was penalized half the distance to the goal, or two yards, for off side and Watson broke through the Caveman line

BUCKEYES VICTOR OVER MINNESOTA, IOWA MASSACRED

Columbus, O., Oct. 28—(U.P.)—The powerful Buckeyes of Ohio State, their eyes on a national championship, smashed a stubborn Minnesota eleven 34 to 14 today before 43,563 fans in University Stadium to extend their undefeated streak to five games and take sole possession of the big ten football lead.

Paced by veteran Les Horvath, a member of Ohio State's big ten championship team of 1942, the Buckeyes roared thru the ground and through the air to take a 20 to 0 halftime lead before the Minnesota power got its stride.

The Golden Gophers, led by whirling Wayne Williams, came back in the second half to score two touchdowns, but the Buckeyes matched that score with two of their own.

Bloomington, Ind., Oct. 28—(U.P.)—Indiana University kept its stars under wraps most of the time today as Indiana swept to an easy, 32 to 0 big ten football victory over punchless Iowa.

A crowd of 8,000 fans watched Indiana roll to a 26-0 halftime margin and then settle back to protect the lead.

The victory, Indiana's third in four conference starts, moved the Hoosiers into second place in the western conference, behind Ohio State, Indiana's opponent next Saturday.

TROJANS TRAMPLE ST. MARY'S, 34-7

Los Angeles, Oct. 28—(U.P.)—The University of Southern California Trojans toyed with St. Mary's teen-aged band of Gaels today and emerged with an effortless 34 to 7 win.

After piling up a commanding 27 to 0 lead at halftime, Coach Jeff Cravath jerked his regulars and let second and third stringers play the entire last half.

The Gaels took advantage of this to punch across a late fourth-quarter touchdown, going 60 yards in nine plays, highlighted by the running of Jack Greulich and Brian McGoldrick and the passing of Dennis O'Connor. McGoldrick scored the touchdown on a wide end sweep that caught the Trojan "irregulars" napping.

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INJURED ILLINI PUTS UP BATTLE, IRISH WIN 13-7

Champaign, Ill., Oct. 28—(U.P.)—Harassed by injuries and penalties which cancelled two touchdowns, Illinois went down fighting today as Notre Dame won its fifth straight football victory of the season, 13-7, before a home coming crowd of 65,114 fans packed into Memorial Stadium.

Illinois' courageous eleven was within 15 minutes of gridiron fame after outplaying Notre Dame for three quarters. But the Irish reached deep into their repertoire of plays to push over a last quarter touchdown that Illinois couldn't match with its sensational touchdown artist, Buddy Young, sidelined by injuries.

Notre Dame's vaunted power, which had rolled up 176 points in four games, was stopped cold most of the afternoon by an Illinois line which showed no respect for the national fame of the Irish's running star, half-back Bob Kelly, or for the Irish's passing ace, Frank (Bobby) Danczewicz.

But a split-second defensive lapse by the Illinois backfield caused the Illinois to slide to their second defeat of the season, after leading 7-6 at the half.

After a 15-yard holding penalty had pushed Notre Dame back to its own 39, Danczewicz faded to the 29 and passed in the plat to Kelly on the 35. The Irish sophomore faked a run, and then lateraled to halfback Maggioni who sprinted down the sidelines for a 65-yard touchdown run. Maggioni came back to plunge for the point as Notre Dame took a victory lead with 3 minutes of the last quarter gone.

The much-publicized scoring duel between Young and Kelly materialized with three minutes gone in the first period when Young, Illinois' negro freshman track champion, sprinted 74 yards down the sidelines for the opening touchdown. Quarterback Don Greenwood converted.

KLAMATH HANDED 19 TO 6 TROUNCING BY EUREKA TEAM

Klamath Falls high school's Pelicans went down in defeat before a superior Eureka, Calif., team 19 to 6 in Modoc stadium, Klamath Falls, Friday night. The defeat came one week after the crushing 21 to 0 set-back handed the Pelicans by the Medford Black Tornado.

Medford, winners of the Southern Oregon conference race with still a game to go, defeated Eureka earlier in the month, 28 to 6 in the coastal city.

Klamath Falls is now in second place in league play with a win, a tie and a loss. The humiliating tie with little Ashland and the stinging Medford defeat are the black marks on the Pelican record. Aside from league play, the Pelicans lost one and won one before the Eureka debacle.

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HUSKIES DEFEAT CALIFORNIA 33-7 IN COAST UPSET

Berkeley, Calif., Oct. 28—(U.P.)—Vengeance-seeking University of Washington Huskies, playing the vaunted University of California Bears right off their feet, pulled the most stunning far west football upset of the season here today as they rolled to a 33-7 victory before a crowd of 40,000 fans.

The astounding victory for the Huskies, following their thorough shellacking by U.S.C. on Monday, upset the dopesters across the nation and threw the Trojans into undisputed lead for the Pacific coast conference title with the inside track to the Rose Bowl.

It was superior line play by the fast-charging Husky line that spelled defeat for the Bears—their initial loss of the year in conference play. The hitherto invincible Bear forward wall was the victim of some old-fashioned spinners and end-around plays from Coach Ralph (Pest) Welch's boys that sent them reeling.

Quarterback Dick Ottel was the mainspring in the Washington drive and it was his long gains, coupled with bull-like rushes by Fullback Keith DeCoursey, that started the Huskies on their victory march.

TALENT DEFEATS POINTERS, 26-0

Talent high school's six-man football team went into undisputed leadership of the eastern division of the county league Friday when they romped to a 26 to 0 win over Central Point Pointers at Central Point. The game was hard-fought all the way despite the lop-sided score. The Bulldogs led 13 to 0 at halftime after crossing the goal

line twice on passes.
 In the second half Tolle tore 50 yards around end for another score and Talent added another tally on an end run later in the half.
