KATONEN READY FOR GRAY MASK IN ARMORY RING

Tonight's main event return grudge match between Paavo Katonen and the Gray Mask at Medford Armory holds promise of filling the arena to capacity to see these two head-butting experts settle their difficulties.

The Mask has taken two Medford victories over Katonen but the powerful Finn is determined that he has solved the problem of how to beat the villainous mystery man and has vowed to give him a "thumping" in tonight's bout.

Katonen claims he had the Mask defeated last week until he ran into a series of head-butts that left him groggy and unable to continue because of a cut over the eye.

Earl Malone will be making his first appearance in Oregon when he faces Ernie Piluso in the second bout. Advance notices say Malone is quite capable of taking care of himself against any type opponent.

In meeting Piluso, he will face a fine legitimate wrestler, whose tactics have made him a staunch favorite in Medford.

Buildup Jackson, veteran campaigner from Alaska, has posted a forfeit to insure his appearance and will meet Tony Ross in the opening bout, scheduled to go to the mat at 8:30.

BEND LOOMS AS TOUGH FOE FOR BLACK TORNADO

Medford's Black Tornado will take the field at Bend Friday night against a tough opponent when they face the Bend Lava Bears in an inter-sectional game, which the Tornado must win to keep in running for a crack at the state football championship.

In comparison between the two teams, Bend stopped Grants Pass 14 to 9 while Medford walloped the Cavemen 41 to 0. Despite the fact that Medford won by a bigger score, Bend has beaten several top-notch opponents this season, having dropped only one game—a 13 to 7 loss to Eugene. The Bears have beaten Salem, Prineville, Redmond, The Dalles, and Hood River.

Medford Coach Al Simpson said yesterday that his team will be at full strength, with the exception of Jerry Clark and that he fully expects a tough game, probably one of the toughest so far this season.

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MAJOR LEAGUES SELECT 19 FROM BASEBALL DRAFT

Chicago, Nov. 2—(U.P.)—Major league baseball clubs today selected 19 players from an eligible list of 589 active players in the third wartime draft of minor league players.

This compared with 23 players selected in 1942 and 16 last year. Three clubs failed to make a selection. They were the St. Louis Browns, St. Louis Cardinals and Detroit Tigers.

It was pointed out however, that additional selections in the draft may be made later by telegram or letter.

The tail-enders in the respective leagues had first choice of players selected and Philadelphia of the National league chose Charlie Sproull, Milwaukee pitcher, and Washington of the American league put the finger on Marino Pieretti, a Sacramento, Calif., pitcher.

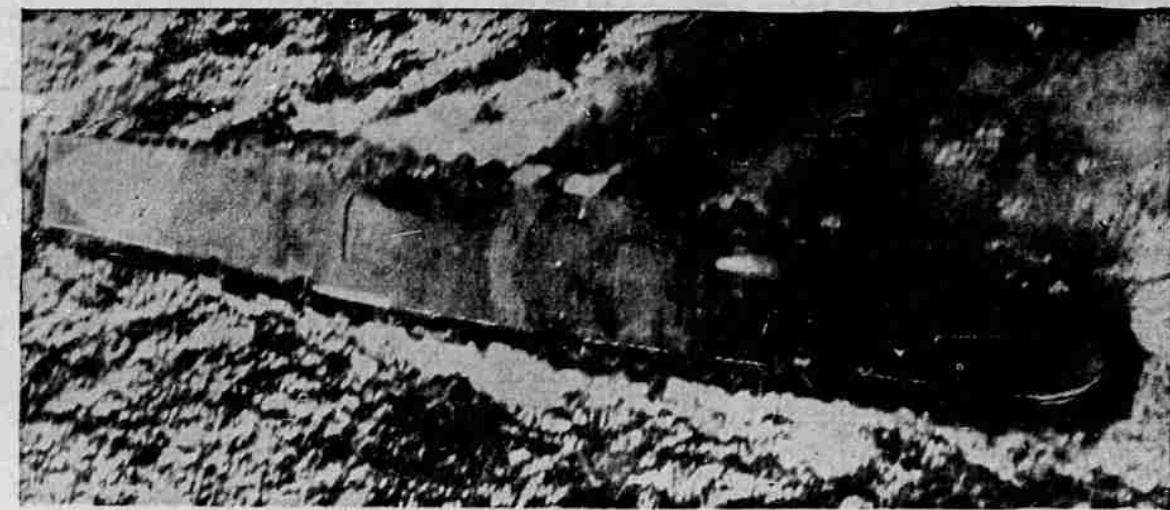

National Forest Timber for Sale

Sealed bids will be received by the Regional Forester, Portland, Oregon, up to and not later than 2:00 p. m., November 13, 1944, for all the live timber marked or designated for cutting and all merchantable dead timber located on an area embracing about 1,120 acres within sections 7 and 8, T. 31 S., R. 3 E., W. M., Rogue River National Forest, Oregon, estimated to be 11,200,000 feet B. M., more or less, of Douglas-fir, and 1,200,000 feet B. M., more or less, of white fir, and an unestimated amount of other species of saw timber. No bid of less than \$4.70 per M feet for Douglas-fir, \$8.60 per M feet for white pine, \$5.60 per M feet for ponderosa pine, \$9.60 per M feet for sugar pine and \$2.10 per M feet for white fir, western hemlock, and other species will be considered. In determining the high bid, the rate for Douglas-fir and white fir only will be considered. Bids with rates in excess of those permissible under MPR 460 will be reduced to the allowable maximum in making the award. In addition to the prices bid for the stumpage, a cooperative deposit of \$0.50 per M feet B.M. to be used by the Forest Service for paying the cost of slash disposal, and a cooperative deposit of \$0.25 per M feet B.M. to cover the cost of tree planting, seed sowing and timber stand improvement work on the area cut over, for the total cut of timber under the terms of the agreement, will be required. \$6,000.00 must accompany each bid, to be applied on the purchase price, refunded or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to conditions of sale. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Before bids are submitted, full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale and submission of bids should be obtained from the Forest Supervisor, Medford, Oregon, or the Regional Forester, Portland, Oregon.

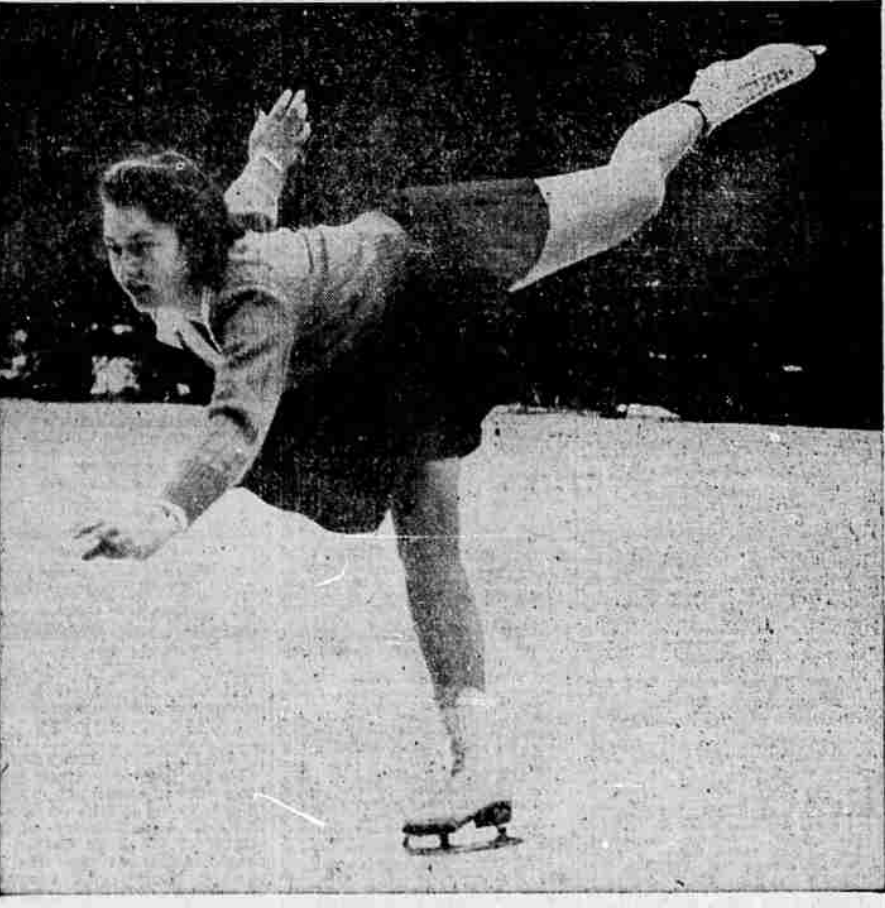
The stockholders consist of national farm loan associations, with the exception of a few borrowers who have obtained loans direct from the bank.
