FDR Sets Thanksgiving Day; Urges Observance By Prayer

Washington, Nov. 2.—(AP)—President Roosevelt today proclaimed Thursday, November 23, as Thanksgiving day and urged Americans to observe it with prayers of thanks for "the preservation of our way of life from the threat of destruction" and for "the promise of an enduring peace."

Calling on the people to back up their prayers "by bending every effort to hasten the day of final victory," Mr. Roosevelt suggested a nationwide reading of Holy Scriptures during the period from Thanksgiving day until Christmas.

"In this year of liberation, which has seen so many millions freed from tyrannical rule," the

president said, "it is fitting that we give thanks with special fervor to our Heavenly Father for the mercies we have received individually and as a nation and for the blessings He has bestowed, through the victories of our arms and those of our allies, to His children in other lands."

"For the preservation of our way of life from the threat of destruction; for the unity of spirit which has kept our nation strong; for our abiding faith in freedom; and for the promise of an enduring peace, we should lift up our hearts in thanksgiving."

The proclamation was in accordance with a joint resolution passed by congress in 1941.
