

BRIBERY USED TO AVOID WAR FRONT IS F. B. I. CHARGE

Claim Thread Manufacturers
Corrupted Army Officer to
Keep Kin From Danger.

New York, Nov. 3.—(U.P.)—Federal Bureau of Investigation agents extended their search today for two of three thread manufacturers accused by the government of corrupting an army officer to protect their relatives in uniform from combat hazards of war.

Major Walter V. Radovich, 24, the flier, was under detention at Mitchell Field. Jerome Usdan, 32, one of the thread executives, was held in \$5,000 bail and FBI agents wanted Samuel Bayer, 51, and his brother, Elias, 49.

Two Detained
The relatives which the three accused men allegedly sought to shield from war's dangers were Pvt. Martin Bayer, 22, and his cousin, Pvt. Morris (Melvin) Usdan, 21. Pvt. Bayer is the son of Samuel Bayer and Pvt. Usdan is the brother of Jerome and the nephew of the Bayer brothers. The two soldiers also were under detention at Mitchell Field.

According to Radovich, Usdan and the Bayer brothers entertained him in a New York night club and praised him to his friends for his accomplishments as a pilot in an air commando unit in the China-Burma-India theater. Radovich had knocked down four Japanese planes and had been decorated for his feats as a fighter pilot.

The thread manufacturers introduced Radovich to celebrities, the flier said, bought him three tailored uniforms, provided several gifts for his wife and finally paid him all but \$50.

of a promised \$7,000 to use his influence in shielding Pvt. Usdan and Bayer.

To Medical Service
Radovich, in his story relayed by army officials in the CBI theater to a Mitchell Field colonel and thence to the FBI, said that he was detailed in 1943 to organize an air commando unit for service in the Asiatic area. He said he ordered Pts. Usdan and Bayer out of a group alerted for transfer overseas and assigned them to the medical service of his own unit.

Later, Radovich said, the two soldiers were transferred out of his medical service and later slated for combat duty which he circumvented by ordering them back to his unit until the danger passed.

Pay Income Tax
Salem, Ore., Nov. 3.—(U.P.)—An increase of about 75,000 tax blanks will be needed this year

for persons paying income taxes, Earl Fisher, state tax commissioner, estimated today, basing the figure on the incomes for 1944. Approximately 475,000 blanks will be needed he said. The blanks will be mailed early in December, Fisher said, and filing must be completed before March 15. About 400,000 were used last year.

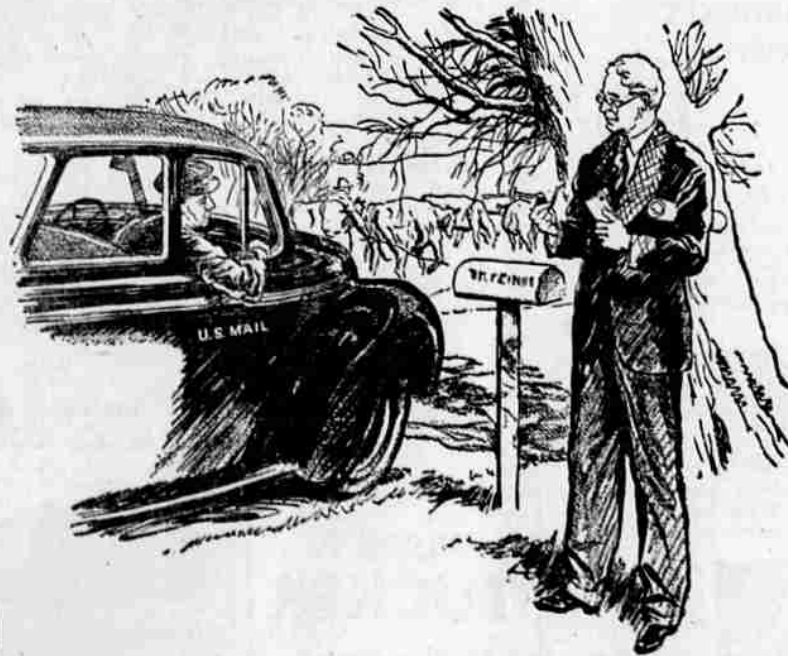
