MISSIONARY TO GIVE SERIES OF LECTURES HERE

Samuel Cassels, widely traveled missionary and religious leader, will speak Sunday morning and evening and at several meetings through the week in the First Presbyterian church, Holly at Eighth street. Mr. Cassels' work has been in the African Sudan and in Ethiopia, two of the colorful missionary fields of the world. Few other fields have ever known such rapid progress from savage superstition and darkness to civilization as has this area.
 The story of the spread of the gospel among the black men of the Sudan and the accompanying transformation from head-hunting and cannibalism to education and civilization is little

short of a romance and sounds like the imaginative tales of an adventurer, according to Rev. Hansen, pastor of the First Presbyterian church.
 Cassels will speak Sunday morning at 11 o'clock and in the evening at 8 o'clock will illustrate his message with pictures. He will also speak Tuesday evening at the Methodist church in connection with the union church meeting there under the auspices of the Ministerial association, and again Wednesday evening at the Presbyterian church. On Friday he addresses the Missionary society of the Presbyterian church at a 2 o'clock tea in that church. All meetings are open to the general public.
