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Blood Pressure—Diastolic
There are two blood pressures. The systolic, which is the pressure registered when the heart is exerting its greatest force, and the diastolic, which is the pressure registered when the heart is at rest—that is between beats. It is usually the systolic pressure that is referred to when blood pressure is spoken of. However, the diastolic pressure is often of greater importance. It may reveal knowledge that is of greater significance than the systolic pressure. It represents the tension which the walls of the arteries exert upon the column of blood. It denotes the pressure that the left ventricle of the heart must overcome to open the aortic valve. If your diastolic pressure goes beyond the proportional range, find its cause and institute a program for its correction.
