MASK UP AGAINST CLEVER OPPONENT IN BOUT TONIGHT

The Gray Mask, unidentified wrestling sensation from Hollywood, will be up against one of the cleverest opponents he has been called upon to face when he meets Ernie Piluso in the top main event at Medford armory tonight. All of the Mask's foes to date have tried to "slug it out" with him but Piluso is one of the best legitimate grapplers now on the coast and plans to use his speed and skill to upset the winning streak of the hooded one.

Piluso will have everything to gain and nothing to lose so far as his mat reputation goes in this match. If he can win, he will be able to demand top money in the coast's leading wrestling circles but if he loses he will be just number eight on the Mask's list of Medford opponents.

Pete Belcastro, the Weed Assassin, will face rugged Tex Porter in the four round middle event. Belcastro was placed in the secondary position when he couldn't make up his mind to meet the Mask.

The opening bout, which goes to the mat at 8:30, promises as much fireworks as either of the other matches. Colorful Bulldog Jackson who is seeking a match with the Mask, will meet Earl Malone in the three round go. Malone possesses considerable science but mixes it up with a majority of maneuvers in violation of the book of rules. Jackson, of course, is anything but legitimate in his wrestling methods.

Promoter Mack Lillard is expecting a packed house tonight to see this fine array of mat gladiators.

Sad Sam Gibson Is Handed Release By Coast League Club

San Francisco, Nov. 5.—(U.P.)—Sad Sam Gibson, dean of the Pacific Coast league pitchers and one of the oldest active players in all of baseball, today reached the parting of the ways with the San Francisco Seals.

The venerable hurler, after 12 years of service with the Seals was handed his release by President Charley Graham, so "that he can dicker for a manager's job."

All of the players the veteran Graham has bought and sold in his many years in the game of baseball, Gibson probably was one of the best long-term investments he ever made.

Over the 12-year stretch, Sad Sam pitched 210 victories against 123 losses. As late as 1942, when he was nearing the half century mark, Sam was good enough to win 20, lose 12 and turn in a 2.78 earned run average for the fifth-place Seals.

FOUR WARM-UP GAMES ADDED TO OSC SLATE

Oregon State College, Corvallis, Nov. 5.—Oregon State's pre-season basketball schedule is nearly complete with the addition of four more games. The Beavers now have a 12-game warm-up slate before opening their conference season against Washington at Seattle January 5 and 6. Two or three more games may be scheduled for December.

Newly added contests are against the Seattle Coast Guard five here Dec. 1 and 2; and against Tillamook Naval Air station at Corvallis Dec. 5 and at Tillamook, Dec. 21. The Beavers will stop off at Tillamook on their way to the Northern division jamboree at Astoria Dec. 22 and 23.

A six-way battle has developed for starting forward posts on the Orange club. The six men battling it out are George Seric, letterman; Ted Henningsen, varsity reserve; Bob Panagis, football letterman out for his first year of basketball; and Dick Strait, Ed Stagg and Chuck Matheson, freshmen. Seric and Henningsen hold a slight edge at present but are getting plenty of competition from the other four.

Coach A. T. (Slats) Gill has been working on both offense and defense in recent workouts. So far he has stuck exclusively to man-for-man defense. Although Gill was the first coach to use and develop the zone in the Northern division, he has been using man-for-man the last three years and plans to again this season.

DEFEATED DEWEY TURNS ATTENTION TO GOVERNORSHIP

Albany, N. Y., Nov. 5.—(U.P.)—Thomas Edmund Dewey, defeated in his bid for presidency of the U. S., turned his attention again today to the full-time job of being governor of New York state.

Dewey returned to the executive mansion in Albany last night from New York City, where he had received returns from Tuesday's election which swept President Roosevelt into a fourth term.

He told reporters he expected to spend a full day at his desk, catching up on state affairs which had been deferred during the intensive two-month campaign.

Plans Rest
In the near future he hopes to get away for a rest, possibly at Sea Island, Ga. He hopes he can take along his two sons, Thomas, Jr., 12, and John, 8, who remained in school during the campaign.

As he returned to Albany, Dewey appeared to be in good spirits and glad that the ordeal of campaigning from coast to coast was ended.

He was particularly gratified at the heavy popular vote which his party rolled up in Tuesday's election, feeling that it indicated the most unity shown in the Republican party in 14 years and demonstrated a sense of purpose and devotion to the country and a willingness to work in harmony.

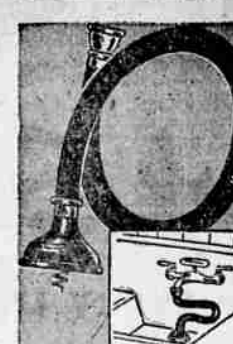

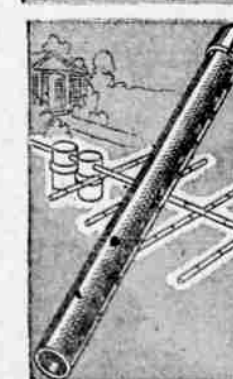
