TORNADO BLASTS GRIZZLIES; 42-13 IN ANNUAL GAME

Ashland Scores In First And Fourth Periods; Medford Eyes District Playoff

Medford's Black Tornado advanced another round toward a play-off for the district 2 championship when they whipped the Ashland Grizzlies, 42 to 13, in the traditional Armistice day football game at Ashland yesterday afternoon. The scrappy little Ashland team, greatly outweighed, made a gallant effort against superior power, but just didn't have what it took to cope with the Medford powerhouse.

Ashland started the game by kicking off to Bob Watson who took the ball on the Medford 20 and returned to the Tornado 43. Earl Bostwick moved the ball to the Ashland 39 and a pass from Watson to Darrill Riggs went to the Ashland 33. Marvin Doty picked up three and then four to go to the Grizzly 26 from where Bostwick crashed through right tackle to reach pay dirt for the first score. Watson kicked the extra point to put the Tornado in front, 7 to 0.

Ashland Scores
Jay Samuelson took Watson's kickoff on his own 13 and returned it to the 37. He then

picked up three yards through center and Jim Jandreau made it a first and ten on the Medford 46. Samuelson then gathered two yards and a pass from John Reedy to Samuelson was good for a touchdown. Roscoe Smith's attempted drop kick was blocked.

Bill Plaskett took Reedy's kickoff on his own 23, fumbled it, then picked it up to run through the entire Ashland team to score. He was aided by fine blocking as he lumbered down the east sidelines with no one laying a hand on him. Watson split the uprights for the extra point.

Tornado Penalized
Watson kicked off to the Ashland nine from where it was returned to the 26. Ashland tried three plays, picking up seven yards and on the fourth down Jandreau kicked out of bounds on the Medford 30. On the second play Medford drew five yards for too much time between plays. Bostwick and Clark altered to pick up a first down and then Watson was smothered while trying to get a pass off and lost 11. Doty recovered his own fumble for no gain and Watson kicked out of bounds on the 45 as the quarter ended with Medford ahead, 14 to 6.

After Samuelson was held for no gain and three of Reedy's passes went incomplete, he kicked to the Medford 31 where it was downed. Doty took a reverse from Watson to pick up two yards, Bostwick added two, Clark picked up four and six on two plays for a first down and Bostwick added another first on the Ashland 45. From there Clark found a hole through tackle and sprinted 45 yards to score standing up. Watson again added the extra point from placement.

Stelle intercepted a pass from Reedy but Medford was forced to kick on fourth down. After three plays Ashland returned the kick. Samuelson intercepted a Medford pass on Ashland's 30 as the half ended with Medford ahead, 21 to 6.

Reedy kicked off to start the third period and a series of Tornado plays advanced the ball to the Ashland 10 from where Ashland was penalized half the distance to the goal for pass interference. On the next play Clark found a hole and was untouched as he crossed the goal line. Watson again added the extra point from placement.

Watson intercepted Reedy's pass after the kickoff, but on the second Medford play Reedy recovered Bostwick's fumble on the Ashland 23. A pass from Reedy intended for Jim Merriman was intercepted by Plaskett who went from the 33-yard line to score. Again Watson's kick was good.

Cocher Al Simpson sent in a new Medford team late in the third period and it was a see-saw affair as the quarter ended. Medford was ahead 35 to 6.

Riggs Scores
Medford lost the ball on downs, but Reedy was forced to kick on the third play with Lindley making a ten-yard return. The Medford seconds then began to roll with a series of running and passing plays advancing the ball deep into Ashland territory from where a pass from Stelle to Riggs was good for a touchdown. Barnhart made the extra point through the line.

Late in the fourth quarter Ashland recovered a Medford fumble on the Tornado 39. Gene Berry gathered a first down and then a pass from Reedy to Sam-

AIR FORCE SQUAD WALLOP HUSKIES

Seattle, Nov. 11—(U.P.)—The veteran Fourth Air Force Flyers from March Field, Cal., gave the teen aged University of Washington eleven a painful football lesson today when they scored once in each period to win a 28-0 victory in the Huskies homecoming game before 28,000 fans.

Indian Jack Jacobs from Oklahoma tossed touchdown passes for the Flyers in the second and third period, both of them gathered in by the sure hands of Woody Strode, UCLA's great colored star of the 1930's.

Fullback Leon Canton, also a former UCLA star, drove over from the Huskies' one-yard line in the first period, and Halfback Jimmy Nelson of Alabama, fired a 24-yard pass to halfback Eugene Meeks of Kentucky, in the fourth period. Tackle Ernie Smith of USC kicked all four conversions.

ARMY MASSACRES NOTRE DAME, 59-0 AFTER 13 YEARS

Irish Take Worst Beating In Their History And Never Had Chance

New York, Nov. 11—(U.P.)—Army, after 13 long years of trying, finally overcame the football legions of Notre Dame today and made up for all those vain attempts by giving the Irish the worst beating in their gridiron history, 59 to 0.

The triumph went a long way toward establishing Army as the gridiron king of 1944. They kept going through the Irish like the Americans went through the Germans in Normandy and had not Coach Earl (Red) Blaik been lenient at times, the Army well could have piled up one of the biggest scores of any football season.

They did enough as it was and the process accomplished with an assist from Navy—something which never had been done against Notre Dame before—losing to both Army and Navy in the same year.

Notre Dame had only one chance to score and the clock stopped that as it ticked off the first half. The only threatening Notre Dame did after that was to try to get out of its half of the gridiron. And it did that only twice—counting that first half drive.

The Cadets, with a fast hard charging line and fleet and sure blocking backs, kicked off and with their unyielding defense forced Notre Dame to punt.

Army got in on the Notre Dame 44 and marched down to the Irish 6-yard line. With fourth down and goal to go the Army was stopped cold, but both teams were offside and the Cadets received another chance. That was all they needed for Kenna took the ball and carried it over.

That was the first of nine Army touchdowns and the Army distributed its offensive power evenly—scoring 20 points in the first period and 13 in each of the other three.

The Irish took to the air after that first Army score and the attempt backfired. Blanchard intercepted a pass to set up the second Army score. Another pass interception set up the third touchdown.

Davis led the touchdown parade with three, but the man who did most of the key blocking failed to get a point. Notre Dame gained only 170 yards in all. Most of that was deep in Irish territory. The Army gained 328 yards in all and wasted none of it.

UCLANS WIN IN MUD OVER BEARS

Los Angeles, Nov. 11—(U.P.)—The University of California at Los Angeles Bruins gained a doubtful revenge today over the California Bears by out-mudding the Bears, 7 to 0, before 12,000 rain-soaked, shivering fans at the Memorial coliseum.

For the most of the afternoon, the two teams made evenly matched by the mud holes scattered over field and by the driving rain which prevented fast ball handling and accurate passing, marched between each other's 30-yard lines.

MICHIGAN DOWNS ILLINOIS, 14 TO 0 IN SURPRISE WIN

Ann Arbor, Mich., Nov. 11—(U.P.)—Illinois' vaunted near-indestructible speed ran into an immovable object today—Michigan's line—and Michigan carried off a 14-0 victory.

Michigan even gave Illinois a lesson in fast action—the Wolverines needed just eight plays and less than four minutes to score their first touchdown.

Meanwhile, the nation's sprint champion, Buddy Young of Illinois, and his fleet companions in the Illini backfield, were finding the Michigan line even less amenable than the Notre Dame forward wall. Young got away just twice for noticeable gains, a 14-yard run and a 27-yard sprint.

Evanston, Ill., Nov. 11—(U.P.)—Northwestern's bid for its first western conference victory went begging today as Purdue, with Freshman Quarterback Stormy Pfohl scoring three touchdowns, picked apart the center of Northwestern's line for a 27-7 triumph to stay in the race for the 1944 big ten football championship.

Columbus, O., Nov. 11—(U.P.)—Ohio State's undefeated Buckeyes marked up their seventh straight victory of the season today by walloping Pittsburgh's "de-emphasized" and hapless football team, 54 to 19.
