Zonta Celebrates Silver Anniversary Of Founder's Day

The silver anniversary of the founding of Zonta in Buffalo, New York, November 8, 1919, was celebrated by all clubs of the organization during the week of November 8.

Zonta, a classified club for professional and executive business women, was organized by a group of nearly 100 women. Nearly four months later, representative of eight clubs met on November 8, 1919, and formed the first "confederation of Zonta Clubs" as it was then called. Zonta is a Sloux Indian name meaning trustworthy and honest.

At present there are 155 clubs with members in several countries. A scholarship of \$500.00 is awarded each year to a woman for graduate study in engineering, with special interest in aeronautics. It is to this Amelia Earhart Scholarship fund that Zonta clubs contribute each year and make the annual scholarships possible.

The local Zonta Club has 25 members, all active in Medford business and professions. They will hold their regular luncheon meeting at the Holland Hotel on Tuesday noon, November 14. At this meeting, which is Guest Day, Mrs. Margaret Fabrick will give a resume of Zonta International history and a birthday offering will be taken for the international fund. 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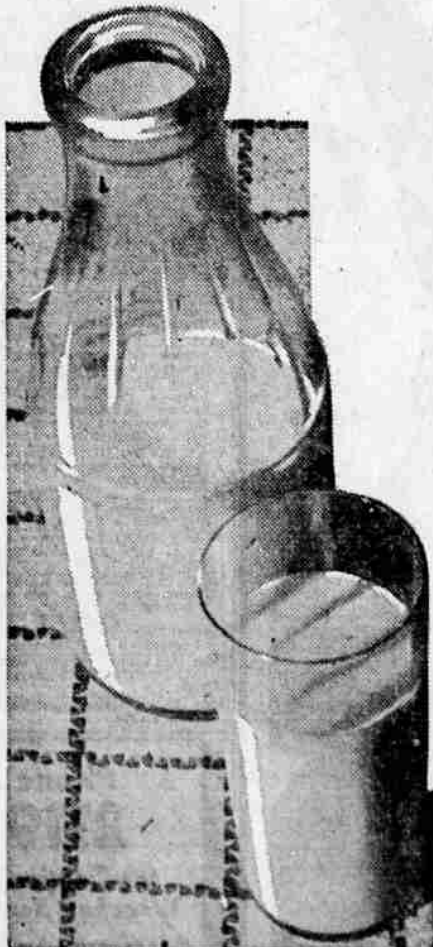
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
