WHO CARES WHAT STEVENSON HAD?

"Robert Louis Stevenson was tubercular," a remarkably well informed correspondent reminds me, "but the immediate cause of his death," the correspondent adds, "was rupture of an aortic aneurism, a malady that has, supposedly, causal relation to Spirochaeta pallida."

All I know about Stevenson's illness and death is what I read in biographies. I had gained the impression that Stevenson was tubercular, not tubercular—there is a difference, as we shall see—and that he succumbed finally to apoplexy, a stroke or shock, rupture of a vessel and hemorrhage into the substance of the brain.

Tubercle is a nodule or lump or swelling either on the surface or in the substance of an organ. Tubercles are characteristic of more than one disease, notably leprosy, lupus, and advanced syphilis. These diseases are tubercular; but only tuberculosis is tuberculous.

It is true that aortic aneurism (distention or ballooning of the great artery) occurs as a rule in men who have had syphilis for fifteen or twenty years, with final involvement of the cardiovascular (heart-artery) system. Spirochaeta pallida is one name for the specific germ of syphilis. It is otherwise known as Treponema pallidum.

My correspondent himself now getting along, is or rather was tuberculous. "The only injunction laid on me by Dr. Trudeau, when I was a victim of it, was," he writes (it being the abbreviation for tuberculosis), "Never get chilled." The soundness of that advice was, I think, indisputable. . . . I am sure that chilling may usher in colds. That many persons fail to catch cold as a result of chill-

EXPERTS DISPUTE RANCHERS VIEWS ON PLANE CRASH

Hanford, Cal., Nov. 11.—(U.P.) Twenty ranchers today testified that they heard a loud explosion before the crash of a Transcontinental and Western Air Lines plane near here the night of November 3—but A. H. Neukalis, a chemical engineer from Chicago, disputed their statements by testifying "physical evidence of the wreckage does not indicate the accident was caused by an explosion."

The testimony was given as the civil aeronautics board conducted a hearing under direction of W. K. Andrews, Washington, D. C., chief of the board's investigation section, seeking to learn the cause of the accident which took 24 lives.

The 20 ranchers testifying all admitted that they did not see the explosion—but that they distinctly heard it.

San Diego, Nov. 11.—(U.P.) The Ancient Order of Snake Snackers held its annual initiation ceremonies today at the mountain cabin of Happy Sharp, famed desert denizen who lives near Jacumba, Cal.
