GRESHAM PICKED TO PLAY WINNER DISTRICT 2 TOGA

Defeats Newberg, 32 To 0; Eugene Downs Albany; Other Scores

Portland, Ore., Nov. 18—(U.P.)—Gresham high school today was chosen to represent district No. 3 in the Oregon high school football playoffs.

Gresham was chosen over Eugene, the nearest contestant, and Cottage Grove and Columbia Prep, also undefeated in league play.

Gresham will play the winner of the Medford-Coquille game, which determines the No. 2 district competitor, while Roosevelt high of Portland and La Grande meet Thanksgiving day in the other semi-final game. A conference faculty committee met today to pick Gresham, since several teams had claims on the playoff berth. Eugene was defeated in a non-conference brush with North Bend, which had been defeated by Coquille and Coos Bay. Gresham also trimmed Oregon City 21 to 0.

and Eugene beat the same team only 14 to 0. Gresham has scored 276 points to 19 for its opponents and wound up last night with a decisive 32 to 0 win over undefeated Newberg.

Eugene defeated Albany, 27 to 0, Cottage Grove blanked Lebanon, 26 to 0, and Columbia Prep eked out a 18 to 13 win over Columbia Prep last night.

PORTLAND' OPEN GOLF MEET GETS TOPNOTCH FIELD

Portland, Ore., Nov. 18—(U.P.)—Every train brought new arrivals this week-end to compete in the \$15,000 Portland Open golf tournament starting Thanksgiving day, kickoff competition on the golden trail of golf's winter circuit.

Portland's reentry into big-time athletics attracted a top-notch field of the nation's best golfers, including Bob Hamilton, the P. G. A. match play champion, Byron Nelson, all-American champion, and Mrs. Betty Hicks, women's champion.

Hamilton, the Evansville, Ind., sharpshooter who upset Nelson for the PGA crown at Spokane, was among the first to arrive and predicted the tough Portland golf course would require a score of about 285 to win, three under par 72. Top prize is \$2666.70 in war bonds and stamps.

A flock of low-handicap amateurs will be gunning for the engraving on the rose-encrusted silver loving cup donated by Robert Hudson, Sr., sponsor of the tournament. The amateur field was up to 41, while there were 62 professionals and 15 women on the lists. A few late entries were expected.

The first score pro's to unlimber found the weather a bit chilly but the weatherman had warmer days predicted. The boys from the east weren't bothered particularly. Those arriving early included Jack Gage, ex-California amateur champion; Bruce Coltart of Atlantic City; Joe Fazio of Pine Valley, N. J.; Hamilton; Mike Turnesa of New York; Joe Zarhardt of Norristown, Pa.; Mike DeMassey of San Francisco; Willie Goggin of White Plains, N. Y.; and others from nearer Portland.

ARMY MAINTAINS RECORD TO BEAT PENN GRID TEAM

Mighty Navy Blasts Purdue, 32 To 0—Middies Use Four Teams In Rout

Philadelphia, Nov. 18—(U.P.)—Unbeaten Army's point-a-minute football forces maintained their average on sun-baked Franklin field today and gave Pennsylvania the second worst defeat in its gridiron history, 62 to 7.

Glenn Davis, the galloping plebe from Los Angeles who is the nation's leading scorer, roared to three touchdowns to spearhead the Army drive before a near capacity crowd of 70,000 fans. The Pennsylvania rout was surpassed only by the 76-10 beating the Quakers took from Princeton in 1885.

As the soldiers scored their eighth consecutive victory in a final tune up for their conclusive game with Navy, Cadet Dick Waterhouse of Washington, Mich., came in for a major share of the glory. For the 20-year-old youngster, an extra point specialist, booted five points from placement for a season total of 44 that tied the intercollegiate record set in 1942 by Clyde LaForce of Tulsa.

Army, despite its one sided triumph, looked ragged on defense as it failed to block and tackle with its usual sharpness.

Baltimore, Nov. 18—(U.P.)—Mighty Navy, tuning up its big guns for the climatic battle with Army two weeks hence, blasted its way to an effortless 32-0 victory today over a game, but thoroughly out-classed Purdue eleven before 25,000 fans.

The Middies played without their biggest gun—Power Runner Bob Jenkins, who favored a leg injury.

But Navy didn't need Jenkins. It had power to spare and exploded it for five touchdowns—two in the first period, one in the third and two more in the fourth. They wasted other opportunities, four times moving inside Purdue's 18 yard line without scoring.

The amazing Bluejacket line was an impenetrable wall as Purdue suffered its first shutout in 18 games. Only once did the Boiler-makers pose a threat. That was in the second period when they drove to Navy's 32. They never again crossed the midfield stripe.

Navy used four full teams in the rout. There were stars galore, but if any single individual stood out above the rest it was triple-threat Hal Hamberg who played his first full game in a month.

YALE WINS OVER CAROLINA, 13-6

New Haven, Conn., Nov. 18—(U.P.)—Yale's undefeated football team scored its seventh consecutive victory today, defeating North Carolina, 13-6, in a game that kept 10,000 shivering fans on their feet in a spectacular fourth period in which the southern threatened to ruin the Eli bid for a perfect season.

TROJANS WALLOP BEARS, 32-0 FOR ROSE BOWL GAME

Berkeley, Cal., Nov. 18—(U.P.)—University of Southern California's Trojans gained the inside track to the 1945 Rose Bowl game today by crushing University of California 32 to 0 before a crowd of 50,000 in Memorial Stadium.

U. S. C.'s touchdown twins, George Callanan and Jim Hardy, led a powerful ground offensive that soon overpowered California's once-powerful forward wall and netted two scores in the first period and one in each thereafter.

It was the worst defeat suffered by Coach Stub Allison's Californians since 1930 and the second worst in the 30-year history of the series.

Los Angeles, Nov. 18—(U.P.)—The University of California at Los Angeles Bruins ran wild today, burying the helpless College of Pacific Tigers under a 54 to 7 avalanche.

Coach Amos Alonzo Stagg's feeble Tigers had the Bruins at bay for most of the first period, but once the UCLA landslide started rolling neither second stringers nor third stringers made any difference in the scoring parade.

Spokane, Wash., Nov. 18—(U.P.)—The Second Airforce football team defeated the University of Washington Huskies 47 to 8 at Gonzaga Stadium here this afternoon.

Spectacular runs by Bill Prentice, ex-Santa Clara fullback, and Ray Evans, former University of Kansas half, gave the superbombers six of their seven touchdowns, each of the two scoring three tallies. Susie scored the other Airforce touchdown on an eight yard plunge. Roderick of Washington scored the only Husky touchdown.

BATTLE ROYAL IS SET FOR ARMORY

Six of the top flight men in the light heavyweight division will clash in a battle royal on a special Thanksgiving wrestling card at Medford armory Thursday night. Those who will participate are Pete Belcastro, Bulldog Jackson, Earl Malone, Pat (Rowdy) O'Doudy, the Gray Mask and Jack Kiser. Kiser is Pacific coast champion.

The card will be started off with all six men in the ring at the same time. The first two to be eliminated will return for the first regular match of three 10-minute rounds. The next two out will meet in the four 10-minute round semi-windup and the last two left in the free-for-all will clash in the one hour top main event.

This will be the first card of its kind at the local arena for three years, Promoter Mack Lillard said, and promises to be a sell-out.
