An article from the Stars and Stripes which tells of the award of a division citation to the 3d battalion of the 362d regiment, 91st infantry division, has been received in Medford by Mr. and Mrs. Tom Swoape, 304 West Jackson boulevard. The clipping was mailed by Cpl. Alvin D. Ferguson, with the 91st when the division was here.

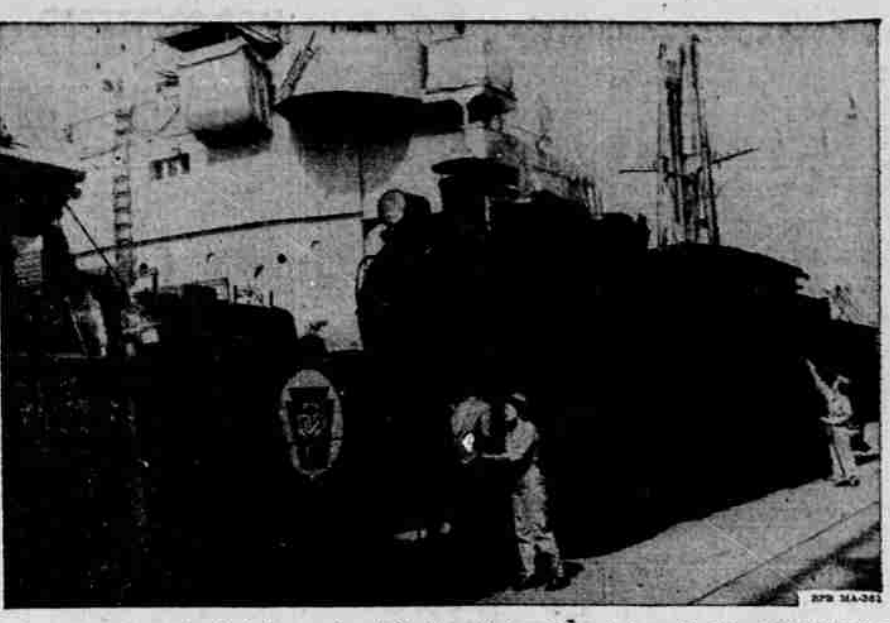
The award was made to the battalion, commanded by Lt. Col. George E. White of Medford, for outstanding action dur-

ing the 5th army's assault against the Gothic defenses in Italy, the articles relates. "Out of communication with the regiment and division and fighting alone, Col. White's men were among the first 5th army troops to stand atop Futa pass," the story states. "They had swept across the Gothic defensive zone's deepest network of prepared fortifications, a feat that won them a division citation."

"The Gothic battles of the 362d regiment will occupy an important chapter in 5th army history," the dispatch continues.

The 362d regiment is commanded by Col. John W. Cotton. Both Col. Cotton and Col. White were with the 91st division when it was stationed at Camp White and Mrs. White is making her home now on the Jacksonville highway.
