## NELSON CHOSEN ADVISOR TO FDR

Washington, Nov. 21—(U.P.)—President Roosevelt has named Donald Nelson as his personal representative and the former war production board chief will serve as an adviser to the president in both domestic and foreign problems, the white house revealed today.

When Nelson is here, he will sit in cabinet meetings, as do heads of various special war agencies.

In a letter dated November 2, the president asked Nelson to "assist and advise me in dealing with some of the most important problems now facing the American people, and to undertake special missions." The appointment was made effective September 20.

## 'THE EYE' ADMITS DOPE RING LINK; WAITS SENTENCE

San Francisco, Nov. 21—(U.P.)—Joe (The Eye) Tocco, reputed New York gangster arrested last August by federal authorities in the uncovering of a large international dope ring, today changed a plea of not guilty to guilty on a charge of possession of narcotics as his trial opened in federal court here.

Tocco faces a possible maximum sentence of 10 years in the penitentiary and a \$10,000 fine. Federal agents who arrested him on a train in Chicago said he had 700 ounces of narcotics valued at \$300,000 in his possession.

Federal Judge Louis E. Goodman denied a motion to allow Tocco to remain free on \$25,000 bail and ordered him held for sentencing Saturday.

Goodman then proceeded with the trial of Salvatore (Sam) Maugeri, Santa Cruz, Calif., boardwalk concessionaire accused of supplying the narcotics to Tocco and operating his concession as a front for the ring smuggling opium from Mexico.

## MECHANIC JAILED FOR WHOLESALLE LOVE INTEREST

Great Falls, Mont., Nov. 21—(U.P.)—Lester Logan Martin, 34-year-old daytime mechanic and night-time Casanova, was lodged in the county jail here today on a warrant charging him with living in open and notorious adultery—with three women, in addition to his wife.

Martin's extra-marital domestic activities caught up with him when deputy sheriffs took him into custody here Saturday, eliminating a two-month search by sheriff's officers and the federal bureau of investigation.

The admittedly prolific mechanic has revealed that he is the father of a 9-year-old son and that his wife is expecting another child, that he is the father of three other children, born out of wedlock to two women, and that he is expecting the birth of another child to a third unwed sweetheart.

**Four-Year Story**  
According to Sheriff John Bradley, Martin's entanglement began four years ago when he met Gwynn Doyle, now residing in Portland, and two children were born to them out of wedlock.

Two years ago he began a courtship with a student nurse from North Dakota. From this association, a child was born five months ago.

His third amour was with Lanelle O'Leary, whom he met in Bremerton, Wash., but who recently moved to Great Falls. Miss O'Leary also is expecting a child.


Meanwhile, Martin's legal wife was unaware of her husband's entanglements. Martin is also being held for questioning by the FBI on violation of the white slavery law.
