In announcing Seal Sale Sunday as November 26, the Rev. Fred M. Weatherford, chairman of the Ministerial association, issued the following endorsement of this activity of the Jackson County Public Health association:
"I regard the Jackson County Public Health association fight against tuberculosis as the most community wide, humanitarian movement within the county. The objective of assisting to recover the health of tubercular patients is indeed a great and worthy cause. It should commend the support of all."
