

Christmas Seal Campaign Under Way; "Wipe Out Tuberculosis" Is Message

PUBLIC SUPPORT URGED IN EFFORT TO BUILD HEALTH

Christmas seals for residents of Jackson County were in the mail today, carrying into every community the message of the Jackson County Public Health association: "Let's wipe out tuberculosis."

The first sheets of seals were delivered to Mayor C. A. Meeker by Postmaster Frank De Souza. The mayor then issued the following proclamation, endorsing the 1944 campaign:

"Emphasizing the importance of maintaining health standards in such critical days as these, I wish to urge all people of Medford to support the work of the Jackson County Public Health association in combating tuberculosis by purchasing Christmas seals."

"All money obtained from the sale of these little stamps, carrying the picture of everybody's

postman, is used to fight tuberculosis. Seventy-five per cent of that money is used in Jackson County. During the last world war I am informed the tuberculosis death rate increased here. We do not want that to

happen again. The best way to keep it from happening is for every citizen to support the program of the Public Health association. I therefore proclaim this week Christmas seal sale week in the city of Medford.

Oregon 4-H State Winners

In recognition of their outstanding 4-H records of achievement, four Oregon club boys and girls have been named State champions in their respective wartime production and conservation activities, conducted by the Extension Service. They are:



Wilma Lyon (photo 1), 17, of Junction City, won top rating in the National 4-H Clothing Achievement for her 9 year record of making 61 garments in addition to mending, patching and darning. Wilma was county champion in the Style Revue of 1941 and 1943. Her award is provided by the Educational Bureau of the Spool Cotton Company.

Dorothy Palmblad (photo 2), 17, of Gresham, is the winner of the 1944 State award in the National 4-H Canning Achievement, provided by the Kerr Glass Corp. During 9 years in club work, the girl put up 3,019 jars of meats, vegetables, fruits, soups and jellies, and won many placings on her exhibits, including \$36.75 in cash prizes. Her estimated value of canned goods on hand is \$1,167.95.

Merton Bradshaw (photo 3), 19, of Brownsboro, is the winner of the State award in the 1944 National Meat Animal Program provided by Thomas E. Wilson, Chicago. During 9 years in club work the boy handled 34 baby heaves and 9 hogs. He won many placings on his meat animal exhibits, including \$154, which brought his total income from all projects to \$3,349.06.

Richard Krenz (photo 4), 18, of Silverton, received the 4-H Home Grounds Beautification State award, provided by Mrs. Charles Walgreen, Chicago. Among his home landscaping achievements were planting vegetables for a Victory garden and adding several new flowers and shrubs to his flower garden, in which there are 43 species. He repaired various things around his home to improve appearance of its surroundings.

The Clothing and Canning Achievement State winners' awards are all-expense trips to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, Dec. 3-6. The Meat Animal and Home Beautification winners receive 17-jewel gold watches. All four winners are eligible to compete for national honors.

DETROIT TOPS IN WAR PRODUCTION

Detroit, Nov. 27.—U.P.—This vital industrial area laid undisputed claim to its unofficial title of "the arsenal for democracy" on the basis of war production board figures released tonight which showed that although 11th in size, the Detroit area was first in the nation with a total of \$21,548,000,000 in war supply contracts since Pearl Harbor.

On the basis of WPB figures, Detroit, with 4.34 per cent of the nation's population, is turning out 12.3 per cent of the country's total \$175,075,000,000 in war supply contracts.
