EARLY FLOOD CONTROL VOTE APPEARS FADING

Washington, Nov. 30—(U.P.)—Hopes of an early senate vote on the \$970,965,000 flood control bill appeared fading today after introduction of an amendment to transfer water conservation reservoir projects in 17 western states from the army engineers to the interior department.

Some senators feel that the amendment, sponsored by Sen. James E. Murray, D., Mont., might make it impossible to pass the flood control bill in this session of congress. Leaders hoped to recess December 15 for the Christmas holidays.

14 BLUE, 1 GOLD
Salisbury, Ill.—(U.P.)—Fifteen stars—14 blue and one gold—comprise the service flag of Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Watkins. The blue stars are for her 10 grandchildren and four great-grandchildren in the army, navy, and marines, fighting on the various war fronts. The lone gold star represents her grandson, Paul B. Dabney, killed in action in Italy.
