**FAIR MAY RESUME**  
Sacramento — U.S. Resumption of "America's biggest state fair" will await U. S. army decision to move storage depot personnel, equipment and stocks which have occupied the grounds since the outbreak of the war, but in the meantime committees for a possible 1945 state fair have been named. The committees will function if the fair is allowed to resume, the board of directors announced.

## PRODUCTION OF PYRETHRUM NEW STATE INDUSTRY

Oregon State College — Research started by the late G. R. Hyslop in 1934 on the production of pyrethrum in Oregon is now bringing results in the form of a new industry for this state. Dr. D. D. Hill, who succeeded Professor Hyslop as head of the farm crops department, announced today.

The McLaughlin, Gormley and King company of Minneapolis, one of the largest manufacturers of insecticides using pyrethrum, has just leased 500 acres of land within the Camp Adair area for the production of the pyrethrum crop.

The initial 500-acre project may be expanded to a couple thousand acres if the enterprise proves as successful as contemplated, the firm's representatives told Dr. Hill.

The increased interest in pyrethrum supplies is caused by a combination of circumstances, says Dr. Hill. The development of the aerosol bomb as a new way of using pyrethrum and similar insecticides to combat flies and mosquitoes points to an enormous increase in demand after the military situation permits its release for civilian use. A domestic supply of pyrethrum must be found to

replace former imports from Japan and other countries.

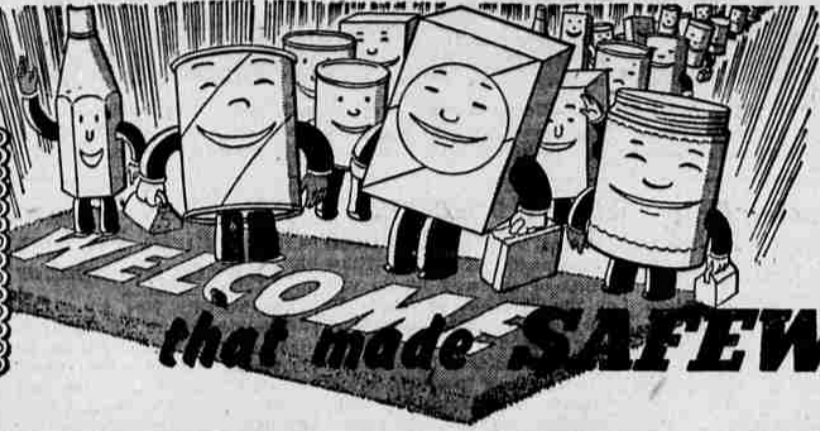
