

JUNIOR CHAMBER AND SENIOR BODY TALK ACTIVITIES

Paul Selby, president of the Jackson County Junior Chamber of Commerce, and Don Foote, Victor Milnes, John Sedell, Glenn Harrison, Wayne Jamison and Gerald Latham, directors, were guests of the Senior Chamber of Commerce at a meeting held Friday to discuss activities of the two groups. Selby responded to the welcome of Karl Janouch, president of the Senior Chamber, with an appreciation of the cooperation of the senior organization. He extended the wish to participate in all civic projects that would benefit the community.

Frank Hull, president of the Oregon Chamber Executives, gave a report on the panel session held in Portland November 20 and 21, covering the subjects of veterans assistance, aviation

In the post-war period, committee on economic development, labor and its attitude in Oregon, retail activities and their problems, preservation of highway and forest areas as tourist attractions and legislation.

Hull also reported that he had appointed a committee to bring about united action among Chambers of Commerce in Oregon, as Hull said, the problems of one community often affect other communities. This committee includes the presidents and managers of the Portland, Salem, Eugene and Klamath Falls chambers who will meet in Medford Tuesday morning to formulate plans for coordination of the Chambers of Commerce. Accompanying this group will be the consulting engineer of the Portland Chamber of Commerce and the manager of their foreign trade and export.

An informative report by Ed Judd, manager of the Medford Irrigation District, who attended the Denver Reclamation Congress, brought out facts concerning proposed reclamation of non-irrigated lands in the Rogue River Valley and the attitude of reclamation service in promotion of these projects. Full explanation of these facts will be available after the Rogue Valley Water Committee holds its regular meeting.

It was also reported that the Oregon Highway Commission is taking necessary steps to secure Rogue River shore line for a state park and that this recreational program is progressing satisfactorily.

\$108,975 CROWD FOR BOND SHOW

With a capacity crowd representing the purchase of \$108,975 in "E" bonds, and with an added \$15,750 in "E" bonds realized in the auction sale, the Bond Premiere and auction at the Craterian theater Friday night made a considerable dent in the county "E" bond quota for the Sixth War Loan.

Highest bid received was that of Wm. Boyd of 608 South New-town street, for the electric iron, on which there was spirited bidding. Mr. Boyd's bid of \$4000 finally won the coveted iron.

Although the gasoline, sugar, pineapple and ham had to be taken off the list of items to be auctioned by orders of the OPA, nonetheless the 28 other prizes added materially to the evening's fun, all of which was held under the direction of Colonel Dudley, well-known valley auctioneer.

BROEDLOW CITED FOR LEADERSHIP IN GOTHIC DRIVE

Col. Rudolph W. Broedlow, commander of the 361st infantry regiment of the 91st division, has received a citation for the legion of merit because of the unusual ability and leadership displayed by him in the cracking of the Gothic line.

The citation was presented by Gen. William G. Livesay, commander of the 91st, for the army commander, Gen. Mark Clark.

Col. Broedlow left Camp White when his regiment was sent south. Mrs. Broedlow and their son Bill, student of Medford high school, remained in Medford, the couple having purchased a home at 535 Haven street.

The citation follows: "For exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding services in Italy from 2 June to 9 September, 1944. Colonel Broedlow demonstrated unusual ability and leadership in commanding his regiment through its first combat operations and his exceptional tactical skill, and complete disregard of self, were reflected in the aggressive spirit and combat efficiency displayed by his command during the assault on the German Gothic line. 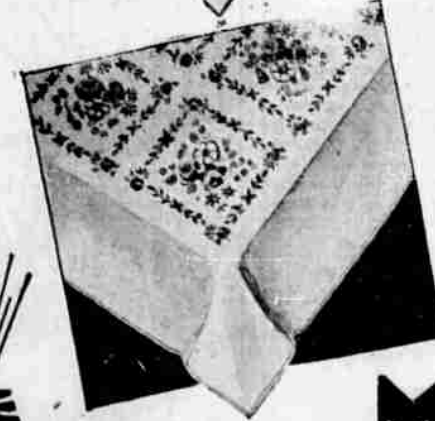
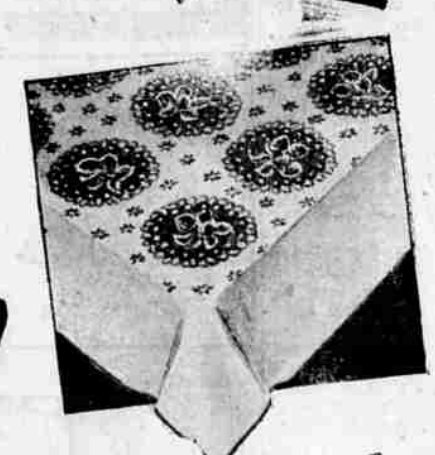
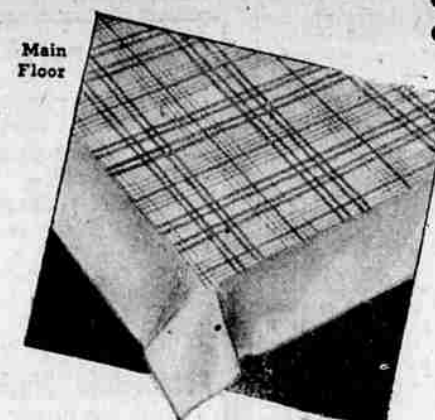
