## 25th Anniversary Is Celebrated By D.A.R. Chapter

Marking a milestone in the history of Crater Lake chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, the chapter celebrated its 25th anniversary with a special meeting and tea at the Girls' Community club the afternoon of November 25. Forty-three were present, including Mrs. Bert B. Lowry, Oregon state regent, Mrs. Boone George Harding, honorary state regent, Mrs. Frances Cochran, state corresponding secretary, all from Medford, and Mrs. Gordon MacCracken, honorary state regent and Mrs. H. W. Andrews, state chairman of filing and lending, both of Mt. Ashland chapter.

Invitations had been extended to Mt. Ashland chapter, Eulonia chapter, Klamath Falls, Rogue River chapter at Grants Pass, past members and other guests.

Mrs. O. H. Brenneman, chapter regent, presided over the meeting during which 12 past regents gave a brief resume of their terms, thus giving a comprehensive history of the growth of the organization.

Important among D.A.R. projects is the marking of historic spots and it was brought out that the local chapter has placed, or had a part in placing, the granite marker near Phoenix which marks the Applegate Road, a monument where Gov. Joseph Lane made treaties with the Indians near the foot of Table Rock, a monument marking Old Ft. Lane, a temporary one marking Ft. Baker, a monument marking the Birdseye place, a bronze plate marking the old church in Jacksonville and a granite marker on the Old Stage Road.

The chapter considers most outstanding the work in Americanism carried on by Mrs. G. Q. D'Albini. Over a period of about 18 years she has instructed over 300 persons in citizenship and aided them in passing citizenship tests.

Under national defense the chapter has sponsored an essay contest for high school students and one for rural students, aim of the contest being to further appreciation of democratic government privileges. Another contest is sponsored in the Junior high school for history students and names of winners are engraved on a silver plaque which hangs in the school. A Girls' Homemakers' contest is also sponsored.

Crater Lake chapter has contributed to student loan funds and to schools, including two in isolated regions entirely supported by the D.A.R., and contributed to the blood plasma fund, to the Red Cross and has a bond-purchase program. The chapter furnished hostesses for the first canteen in Medford and members aid with the city's various war service projects.

Other projects include aid with compilation of cemetery records, sponsorship of an LCI boat, contributions to the Angel Island fund for immigrants and participation in the good citizenship pilgrimage whereby an outstanding senior high school girl from each state is sent to the national conference each year.
