front extending across Hungary from northeast to southwest exploded into furious action as the Germans poured reserves into the Austrian gate below Balaton and the new danger zone southwest of Budapest. Enemy reports said Marshal Feodor I. Tolbukhin's 3d Ukrainian army, without slowing the tempo of its drive for Austria, had wheeled its right flank northward to join Marshal Rodion Y. Malinovsky's 2d Ukrainian army in a great pincer assault on the Hungarian capital. Moscow's early morning war bulletin partially confirmed the Berlin account, reporting that Tolbukhin's forces had spearheaded 14 miles northward along the west bank of the Danube to take Racalmas, 29 miles south of Budapest.

MISTRIAL ORDERED IN SEDITION CASE

Washington, Dec. 7—(U.P.)—The mass sedition case ended in a mistrial today. Federal District Judge James M. Proctor formally declared a mistrial of the seven month old proceeding after a poll of defendants revealed that they would not consent to continuing with another judge presiding. The special session was held to determine disposition of the case as the result of the death of Judge Edward C. Eicher a week ago. The jury was called in after the poll of the defendants and told that "in view of the death of Chief Justice Eicher in the midst of the trial of this case and the circumstances that have been developed here, the court feels compelled to discontinue the trial and formally declare a mistrial of this case." Only one of the 26 remaining defendants was willing to continue.

MARINE COMMANDER FOR TRAINING BOYS

San Francisco, Dec. 7—(U.P.)—Maj. Gen. Julian C. Smith, former commander of the famed marine second division, and newly appointed commanding general of the Marines' Department of the Pacific, today was on record in favor of compulsory military training for American youth. "Only highly trained troops containing a large nucleus of pre-war trained men could have beaten the Japs at Tarawa and the southern Palaus," Smith told a press conference.

WOODROW W. NEWBURN TRIAL OPENS TUESDAY

Woodrow Wilson Newburn, millworker, indicted by the last grand jury on a charge of statutory rape involving a minor girl, will go on trial before a jury in circuit court next Tuesday. A civil action is scheduled for Monday, the day originally set. **LUMBER OUTPUT UP**
