

MOCK ATTACK TO BE HIGHLIGHT OF WAR BOND SHOW

Veterans from Attu, Newfoundland and Greenland will take part in the gigantic Infantry Bond Show coming to Medford Saturday. Flame-throwers, bazookas, carbines, BAR, light and heavy machine guns, infantry pistols and bayonets will be on display at the Riverside USO beginning at 1 o'clock Saturday afternoon and lasting until 5 p. m. At Medford high school stadium, beginning at 7:45 and lasting about an hour, the public will see members from the famous 4th infantry stage a simulated attack on a Japanese pillbox.

During the weapons exhibition the flame thrower is to be explained by veterans who have used it. Later the flame thrower will be used to eliminate the final Japanese resistance in the 30-minute assault on an enemy pillbox.

The bayonet, a small piece of steel about two inches wide and 10 inches long, is one of the most important tools of the combat infantryman and will be used in the closing stages of the pillbox attack.

Many other weapons used by the infantry will be on display during the afternoon and will be used during the evening show.

CAMP WHITE NEAR BOND SALE GOAL

Camp White, Ore., Dec. 12—Halfway through the Sixth War Loan drive, Camp White was only \$11,840.25 short of its \$50,000 goal in war bond sales, First Lt. John B. Cowan reported today, as post war bond officer.

He predicted the camp would be well over its quota by the end of the drive, civilian employees already having purchased \$548 worth of bonds over their \$20,000 allotted quota. Officers of the post during the first two weeks of the drive bought \$9,025 in war bonds, only \$75 from their \$10,000 goal for the drive.

Enlisted men and WACs have purchased \$8,032 worth of war bonds, \$1,068 short of the halfway mark for their \$20,000 quota.

Largest individual purchase of war bonds on the post was made by T/4th Grade Albert O. Johnson, prisoner of war guard section mess sergeant, who bought \$2,100 worth of bonds last week.

WLB ATTORNEY WILL SPEAK AT LUNCHEON MEET

William A. Babcock, regional attorney for the 12th Regional War Labor Board, will be the featured speaker at a Wednesday noon luncheon meeting at the Holland hotel. Meeting will be for employers, sponsored by the Medford Chamber of Commerce, and will hold an informal meeting with union representatives later in the afternoon to discuss local wage and labor problems.

At the noon meeting, Babcock who was attorney for the National Labor Relations Board in Seattle before joining the staff of the War Labor Board, will explain the duties of the enforcement division and the penalties which can be imposed upon firms found in violation of the national wage stabilization act. The meeting will be followed by short interviews with individual employers who wish to discuss specific problems.

Labor Legal Expert
Well grounded in the field of labor relations as connected with government regulations, Babcock is a qualified and interesting speaker on War Labor Board policies and enforcement procedures.

Local labor leaders are urged to attend the afternoon meeting and present their problems on an informal basis in a question and answer session with Babcock. Booklets which contain detailed information on general orders and wage stabilization regulations will be available at both meetings to those who are interested.

NAME KYLE HEAD OREGON SAVINGS AND LOAN GROUP

Robert F. Kyle, Medford, secretary of the First Federal Savings and Loan association, is the new president of the Oregon Savings and Loan league, having been elected at the closing session of the annual meeting held Friday and Saturday in Portland. Kyle served as first vice-president last year.

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GEN. ARNOLD SAYS JAPS CAN'T TAKE HEAVY BOMBINGS

Los Angeles, Dec. 12—(U.P.)—Gen. Henry H. Arnold, head of the army air forces, believes that continued bombing of Japan will pay even greater dividends than bombing of Germany, for Japan lacks the facilities to repair bombed installations that Germany has had.

At a press conference late yesterday, Gen. Arnold said he didn't have the answer to the question of can Japan be bombed to defeat. But the great aerial offensive against the concentrated industries of Japan will not be in full swing until more B-29s are completed, he said.

There are two schools of thought among scientists regarding the possibility of German rockets screaming across the Atlantic, he said. One believes it is possible, the other says it can't be done.

General Arnold cautioned that America has let down a bit since the allies' push across France. The Germans were able to reform their defense lines when the allies outstretched their supply lines, he said, and many Americans are still coasting on the illusion that was created by the first spectacular victories.

Washington, Dec. 12—(U.P.)—The United States government believes that establishment of a free and democratic Jewish commonwealth in Palestine should await the end of the war.
