HOUSEWIVES TO CONTINUE USING RATIONED SUGAR

Chicago, Dec. 12 — (U.P.)—American housewives probably will continue to buy sugar the ration stamp way until the end of the war, President J. E. Hutson of the Commodity Credit corporation today informed the field crops conference held in connection with the American Farm Bureau Federation's 26th convention.

He pointed out that "in wartime it is difficult to import enough sugar to fill our needs and that we can't produce it in sufficient quantities to relieve the situation."

There will be no real relief, he said, until Cuba begins to fill Europe's sugar order and the Philippines resumes production for the United States.

ALEUTIANS RATED EARTHQUAKE AREA

Pasadena, Cal., Dec. 12—(U.P.)—A "strong" earthquake which could have caused severe damage in an inhabited area was reported today by California Institute of Technology, 3,200 miles northwest in the western Aleutian islands.

Dr. Leo Gutenberg, chief seismologist here, said the differential was accounted for by the greater distance from the Aleutians to the eastern seaboard. He discounted an early theory that the earthquake was centered in South America.

Berkeley, Cal., Dec. 12—(U.P.)—An hour-long earthquake, fairly severe and probably occurring in the Aleutians, was reported today by Dr. Perry Byerly, University of California seismologist.

The tremor was recorded at 9:25.09 o'clock last night and was approximately 2900 miles distant, Dr. Byerly said.
