TWO RED CROSS UNITS TO START DURING JANUARY

Two new Red Cross production units will start sewing in January, according to Mrs. Orin Schenck, chairman. Daughters of the Nile will form a Red Cross sewing group January 11, under chairmanship of Mrs. Bill Young.

A group of Zion Lutheran Church ladies under leadership of Mrs. Paul Rynning will also start work early in January. Any women in this church interested in Red Cross sewing are asked to sign up with Mrs. Rynning as soon as possible.

All churches and clubs interested in forming a group to start Red Cross sewing or knitting are asked to contact the Red Cross office, 4405, at once.

Experienced cutters are also needed at once, to work on the 735 pounds of material for hospital garments.

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Eight cartons were shipped out this week, containing 371 knitted garments, 110 slippers, 25 hospital garments, nine wool afghans and 140 filled kit bags.

FINAL BRIEFS IN RAY SUIT FILED

Final briefs of opposing attorneys have been submitted to Judge Herbert K. Hanna in Equity Case of Charles R. Ray, et al. versus Frank H. Ray, et al. H. M. Anthony, San Francisco, and Frank P. Farrell, Medford, attorneys for plaintiffs in their rebuttal brief, ask for accounting of \$344,000 of moneys which came into two corporations, Gold Ray Realty Company and Gold Ray Investment company, with no dividends to minority stockholders. This figure was agreed on by A. Orin Schenck, plaintiff's auditor, and Leland J. Knox, defendant's auditor.

In the brief, plaintiffs ask for receivership so that 3300 acres now remaining to two corporations may be liquidated and moneys rightfully belonging to minority stockholders may be obtained, together with \$50,000 damages, and cancellation of Frank H. Ray's claimed indebtedness.

The case is now in hands of Judge Hanna of circuit court for decision.

WAR BOARD HEAD HITS STATEMENT OF WARD COMPANY

Washington, Dec. 16—(U.P.)—Chairman William H. Davis of the War Labor Board charged tonight that Sewell Avery, chairman of the board of Montgomery Ward & Co., was drawing "a veil over the company's refusal to increase its substandard wages by deliberately repeating all of his familiar misstatements regarding maintenance of membership."

Davis made the charge in a statement as the WLB moved to ward action Monday to refer the company's non-compliance with WLB directives in four Detroit stores and in six other cities to the Office of Economic Stabilization for sanctions or seizure of the properties.

The Davis statement was prompted by an advertisement placed by Avery in newspapers in Detroit where a strike is in progress at the four stores.

"Mr. Avery has published in newspaper advertisements," Davis said, "a statement to his employees in which he gives the impression that maintenance of membership is the only issue involved in the Detroit strike. Nowhere does he mention the fact that for over six months the company has not put into effect the wage adjustments directed by the WLB."

"These adjustments would increase the minimum basic salary rate in the Detroit stores to stand for a 44-hour week, or 46 cents an hour with diminishing increases to those above the minimum."

DEATH COMES TO NOAH B. LYON, 69

Noah B. Lyon, 69, of 27 Tripp street, passed away suddenly Friday evening.

He was born in Missouri, Sept. 16, 1875, and for the past 48 years had made his home in this community. He owned and operated the Hiway Cafe for many years. In 1928 he sold out and moved to Phoenix, returning to Medford five years later.

He leaves his wife, Mrs. Maud Lyon; three children, Mrs. Thelma Gafraith, Lodi, Calif., Sgt. Donald Lyon, U. S. army, Miss Marie Lyon, Salem; and two sisters, Mrs. L. M. Wetzel, Portland, and Mrs. Bertha Van Hardenburg, Stockton, Calif.

LINFIELD PLANT, FLAME LEVELLED

McMinnville, Ore., Dec. 16—(U.P.)—A \$25,000 fire that burned to the ground the Linfield college heating plant today left the campus without heating facilities, but an initial survey indicated that boilers and equipment can be repaired before school convenes after the Christmas holidays.

Two adjoining buildings were threatened for a brief period as firemen worked to prevent spread of the blaze, which was believed to have spread from sawdust in the front boilers. The plant, which was not insured, contained two boilers of sufficient capacity for heating 18 buildings. One truck and two gasoline-powered lawnmowers were lost in the wooden building.

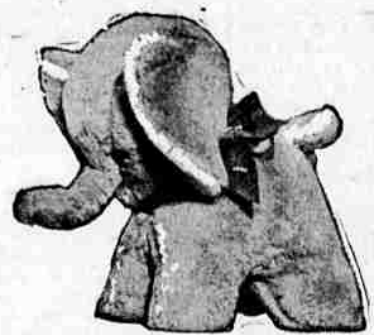
