

CANTERBURY DEAN RAPS CHURCHILL GRECIAN POLICY

Canterbury, Eng., Dec. 16.—(U.P.)—The dean of Canterbury, The Very Reverend Hewlett Johnson, said today that Prime Minister Churchill's policy in handling the Greek crisis was "perilously fascist" and that he had done "irreparable damage to British ideals and morals which we are supposed to be fighting for."

Commenting on H. G. Wells' recent newspaper article saying that "Churchill must go," the dean of Canterbury said in an interview that "Mr. Churchill has done more damage than his worst enemy could have done to the reputation he built up during the war."

"By taking over and using concentration camps in Greece and police organized by the Nazis, and by seizing and thrusting into these camps anyone showing left-wing tendencies he has followed perilously in the fascist line," the dean said.

CROP INSURANCE TO WHITE HOUSE

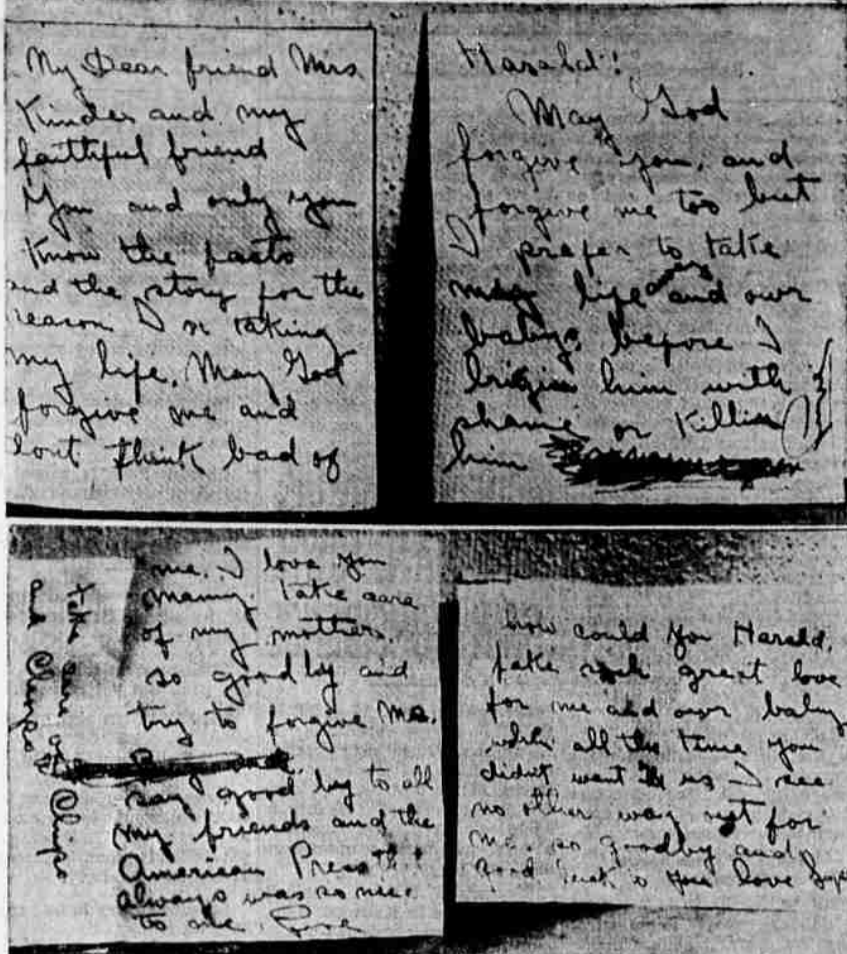
Washington, Dec. 16.—(U.P.)—Congress today collected legislative action on and sent to the White House a bill to provide all-risk crop insurance on wheat, cotton and flax for 1945 harvest.

A compromise conference version of the bill was approved by both house and senate today. It retained an amendment sponsored by Sen. Hendrick Shipstead, R., Minn., raising from \$20,000,000 to \$30,000,000 the amount the War Food Administration may offer farmers to increase flax production next year.

TOKYO SUPERFORT LOST CO-PILOT

Aboard Seaplane Tender Somewhere in the Marianas, Dec. 16.—(U.P.)—(Via naval radio)—Ten members of a Superfortress crew, who ditched their bullet-riddled sky giant in the Pacific on the pitch-black night of December 3 after a Tokyo raid and floated for 11 days in three life rafts, were brought aboard this seaplane tender today.

Only the co-pilot, believed to have been stunned or killed when the huge plane was crash-landed blindly, was missing. The others were picked up by a destroyer as they headed in desperation for the Philippines after losing hope of being sighted.

HITLER HIDEOUT UNDER AIR FIRE

Stockholm, Dec. 16.—(U.P.)—Swedish newspapers said today that allied planes on Friday for the first time appeared over Berchtesgaden, meeting fierce anti-aircraft fire from Adolf Hitler's "personal batteries."

The reports said the planes made reconnaissance photographs of an airfield 80 miles south of Berchtesgaden.

FORDHAM BEATEN
Princeton, N. J., Dec. 16.—(U.P.)—Pouring in 42 points in the last 20 minutes, the Princeton basketball team conquered Fordham in Baker Rink today, 73 to 51.

FILM QUEEN AND DIRECTOR MARRY

Hollywood, Dec. 16.—(U.P.)—Veronica Lake, glamorous screen star, and Andre de Toth, motion picture director, were married tonight at the home of Ed Gardner, radio star of Duffy's Tavern, with only intimate friends and business associates present.

Beverly Hills Judge Charles J. Griffin performed the ceremony with Mrs. Reta Beery as matron of honor and Miklos Dora as best man.

Miss Lake wore a long, ice blue crepe dress with a choker of pearls and a bridal bouquet of white orchids.

There will be no honeymoon for the 22-year-old bride and her 31-year-old husband and she is currently working in Paramount's good intentions. It was the second marriage for Miss Lake, the first for De Toth.

ARMY HOSPITALS SURE OF SMOKES

Washington, Dec. 16.—(U.P.)—Steps have been taken to forestall any shortages of cigarettes in veterans hospitals, Brig. Gen. Frank T. Hines, administrator of veterans' affairs, announced tonight.

He said arrangements have been made with manufacturers of popular brands of smokes to supply the veterans' administration with tax-free cigarettes to be sold to patients at cost when there are not sufficient supplies available through commercial channels.

MORGENTHAU SAYS BOND SALE WILL TOP 19 MILLIONS

Washington, Dec. 16.—(U.P.)—Secretary of Treasury Henry Morgenthau, Jr., predicted tonight that sixth war loan sales would exceed \$19,000,000,000 when all returns are complete and that the \$5,000,000,000 individual goal would be "fully achieved."

The treasury's war finance division announced that sixth war loan drive sales stood at \$17,586,000,000 according to latest tabulations. Corporation sales amounted to \$13,446,000,000 and individual sales totaled \$4,140,000,000, including "E" bond sales of \$1,683,000,000.

Morgenthau, reporting to the nation on the success of the drive

at its formal close tonight, declared in a mutual network broadcast that the staggering total sales were "a magnificent demonstration of home-front solidarity."

"There has been some stupid and dangerous talk of late," he said, "that civilians over here are defaulting on their obligations to their fighting men. This sixth war loan is a concrete answer to such nonsense."

EXTEND TRIAL TIME
Washington, Dec. 16.—(U.P.)—President Roosevelt has signed a resolution extending for six months the time within which court martial proceedings may be instituted against army or navy personnel in connection with the Pearl Harbor disaster, the White House announced today.

The civil aeronautics board tonight announced a slight relaxation of security restrictions in private flying regulations according to an agreement worked out with the military services.
