Funeral services will be held at the Peril Funeral Home Wednesday at 11 a. m. The Rev. Harry Hansen of the Presbyterian church will officiate and interment will be in Siskiyou Memorial Park.

Chicago—(U.P.)—A miniature house incorporating all known safety features was unveiled at the National Safety Council's 33rd annual meeting here, as a new step to teach the public how to avoid breaking its collective neck.

Home falls take a toll of 32,500 lives annually, William

Davidson, architectural engineer of the midget safety house, pointed out in exhibiting his model featuring stairways with low risers for easier ascent, carpets and rugs sized to be slip-proof and windows washable from the inside.

Other safety features incorporated into the no-accident home included rounded, smooth corners on counters and cupboards in the kitchen, small night lights near doorways, bedroom furniture arranged to prevent stumbling accidents, and an electric light or switch near the bed.
