Mr. and Mrs. C. V. Tiede, formerly of Eagle Point and now living at 645 Pine St., Medford, received official notice this week that their son, Clarence L. "Tommy" Tiede, aviation metallurgist second class, U.S.N.R., reported missing in action since the sinking of the Liscomb Bay Nov. 24, 1943, must be presumed killed in action on that date.
