315 LIVES TOLL DURING HOLIDAY

Hundreds of accidents marred the nation's Christmas holidays, taking at least 315 lives, a survey by the United Press showed today.

Of the total, 189 were caused by traffic accidents since mid-night Friday. The heaviest toll was taken in California, where highway accidents claimed 31 of the state's 39 accidental deaths during the week-end. New York followed with 30 deaths, 18 of them in traffic along ice-coated highways.

SAILOR PARADING IN ROLE OF HERO ARRESTED BY FBI

San Francisco, Dec. 26.—(U.P.)—The FBI today arrested in Hollywood Charles Lyons, Jr., 22, Azusa, Cal., a glib navy deserter who was wine and dined by club celebrities and military officers on the pretense that he was a wounded marine hero who had been awarded the congressional medal of honor and kissed by Mrs. Roosevelt.

Nat. J. L. Pieper, FBI field agent, said Lyons was taken into custody at the home of Actor Dennis Morgan after agents read in a Hollywood column that Morgan had taken Lyons home from the Hollywood Canteen as a house guest under the name of "Chuck O'Brien."

AWOL Since 1944
Pieper said Lyons has been AWOL from Camp Shoemaker, Pleasanton, Cal., since Oct. 17, 1944, and was wanted for illegally wearing a marine uniform and on suspicion of writing a series of bad checks.

Two things tripped up Lyons and his high-flying career through crowds of hero-worshippers, according to Pieper. One was the syndicated columnist's reference to "Chuck O'Brien" as a holder of the Congressional Medal of Honor; and the other was Lyons' error in claiming that he had invaded Saipan after Guam—when actually, Guam was invaded after Saipan.

class, wore not only a phoney medal of honor but a navy cross, purple heart, presidential citation and three foreign service ribbons with stars, Pieper said. He bandaged his left hand to make it appear that it had been amputated, and carried a cane— with the explanation that he had suffered machine-gun wounds, the FBI reported.
