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DRAFT DODGERS RECITE VARIOUS EVASION TALES

FBI Records Prove Effort To Keep Out Of Army Fails To Pay Dividends

Washington, Dec. 27.—(U.P.)—More than 11,000 draft dodgers and accomplices have learned—the hard way—that it doesn't pay to try to dodge the draft. For their efforts since 1940, they have been sentenced to prison terms totaling 28,481 years and fines aggregating \$1,006,862.

And yet, according to the federal bureau of investigation, "it is not difficult to stay out of trouble insofar as selective service regulations are concerned."
Cases Cited
FBI records tell a bizarre tale of draft dodging by city slickers, country bumpkins and in-betweeners. For example, take the case of Everett Stewart, Louisville, Ky., who reported his own death to his draft board while posing as his half-brother. He got three years.

The brothers Vosylus, George 23, and Adolph, 22, of Waterbury, Conn., hit upon what they thought was a perfect bit of dodging—but they were wrong. George, who didn't think he'd like army food, and his brother rowed out into Winnepesaukee lake, New Hampshire, overturned the boat and swam ashore unobserved.
G-men, who were called into the case when the lake was dragged and no bodies were found, captured the brothers in Arizona. Given an opportunity to be inducted voluntarily, the brothers ironically failed to pass their physical examination so they were tried, convicted and sentenced.

Too Many Snakes
Ponder the strange case of James Louis Sharp, husky, 34-year-old Athens, Ark., woodsman who thought nothing of defying the government but couldn't stand to be lonesome and around large rattlesnakes. Emerging from the woods where he remained hidden for seven months, Sharp said on surrendering that in addition to lonesomeness and rattlesnakes, he feared he might become ill and die; that he might freeze to death and that the mosquitoes "almost ate me up." These discomforts were not present at the federal prison to which he was sentenced for two years.

J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the G-men, frankly admits that his agents can never be sure what facts will be uncovered in any investigation. In proof, there is cited the case of a negro registrant who is given the fictitious tag of "Oscar Everett" in FBI public records, who turned out to be a woman when "he" was ordered in for a physical examination.
In 1936, it was found, "Oscar" married a widow with three children whom she subsequently supported from wages earned by working alongside men in hard physical toil. "He" or "she" was not prosecuted because the government held that the masquerade was not based on fraudulent intent.

Fortune Teller Falls
Mrs. Cora Blanche Teets, a fortune teller by occupation, muffed a good opportunity to foretell her own future.
According to the FBI, Mrs. Teets offered to sell Andy Ferguson (fictitious name), a prospective drafter, "stuff to keep you from going" into the army after she had overheard a conversation in a "share-the-ride" taxicab in Clarksburg, W. Va. The proposal was reported by "Ferguson" to G-men who trapped Mrs. Teets with marked money.

Upon questioning she reportedly admitted she had counseled Ferguson to evade the draft but insisted she was only "joking." A jury must have thought it was a bum joke because they gave her five years.
The war wasn't this country's affair so far as Paul Young (fictitious) was concerned, it developed. When FBI agents apprehended him in a heavily-wooded section of upper Michigan, he didn't know he had to register for the draft; had lived alone in the woods for 20 years; had no radio; read no newspapers and had no knowledge of current events. He knew a war was on but he didn't know the United States was involved.
Taken to Marquette, Mich., "Young" was visibly excited by the automobiles, traffic and people encountered in the woods when it was found that he was over-age and had a glass eye.
