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IF YOU MUST DYE TO WIN
The wag who cracked that the trouble with life insurance is you must die to win muffed it badly.

Speaking as a sucker for life insurance I'd say one of the chief benefits is that it makes the thought of dying so much less dreadful for the insured. Indeed you win every time you pay a premium.

If you believe that by "touching up," lightening, darkening, bleaching or dyeing your hair you can better your economic or social status by all means do so. Only keep in mind that when one resorts to such artifice the success or satisfaction derived from it will depend upon the art or skill with which it is applied. If the effect is obviously artificial one stands to lose rather than gain by the make-believe.

I cannot recommend hair dyes. If hair is to be dyed, bleached, darkened or lightened, it is best to entrust the job to an experienced hair-dresser or barber. Some preparations sold to the public for this purpose contain poisons. Several such preparations are mixtures containing lead acetate (sugar of lead), silver nitrate (lunar caustic), or paraphenylenediamine—the last mentioned being used also for dyeing furs.

Henna or a mixture of henna and catechu is safe for tinting the hair red. Walnut extract (if not mixed with other chemicals) is safe for tinting hair brown. Chamomile flowers or a tea made of them may be used for giving an auburn tint to dark hair or a golden luster to fair hair.

For goodness sake, folks, don't assume that I guarantee satisfaction with any of these things. If you try any of them you should proceed with caution—experiment first with a single lock of hair before you undertake the whole works. One other harmless home

JEWETT ENJOYS VISIT TO ROME, ANCIENT RUINS

While other cities of Europe are in ruins, Rome is "virtually untouched," T/S Richard D. Jewett, former Mail Tribune reporter, declares in a letter recently from somewhere in Italy. Jewett, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard P. Jewett of Central Point in making this observation wrote:

"Here in sunny—some of the time—Italy life at present leaves little to be asked. For instance, at the moment I'm doing a tour of CQ in a cozy room heated by a steam radiator and enlivened by a blaring radio. My 'home' is in a building, a grand setup after living for nearly two years in tents.

"A so-called vacation experienced on arrival is now over and I'm back on the job. During the 'playtime,' however, I managed to see Rome, Cassino, the old Pompeii and a sizeable portion of the countryside."

Jewett spoke highly of the Red Cross efforts in Rome to entertain GIs and was after an organized Red Cross tour of that city that he wrote of his experiences.

"I found one thing publicized about Rome to be true," he said, "in nearby towns are grim evidences of war's destruction, but the Eternal City itself is virtually untouched. I don't have much to go by in way of comparison, but I'm willing to wager that Rome, except for its monuments looks similar to a busy U. S. city in wartime. Most apparent to the GIs are the many peddlers and solicitors—men, women and children—all after business. The big-time operators may let go with a longo like this: 'Hey, Joe, wanta eat, wanta drink, wanta sleep?—sell cigarette.'"

Jewett told how he and his friends saw the Palazzo Venezia, once the office of ambassadors and later headquarters for Benito Mussolini, and the Coliseum, the ruins of which they explored.

"Next," he said, "we headed toward the Appian way and passed by the Circus Maximus. We went out through the Gate of S. Sebastian to the church for which the gate is named. After viewing the interior of the church we were led through a section of adjacent catacombs by an old Franciscan father. Each of us carrying a small candle.

"A bus brought us back to the city to the Pantheon, tomb of the two preceding kings and the painter Raphael. Highlight of the excursion was the final stop at St. Peter's church."

He described the famous church as "vast in structure and in quality and quantity of art." A second tour took Jewett to other historical landmarks and art centers in and around Rome, including St. Paul's church and the English cemetery.

In concluding his letter, Jewett said he "recently received the first Tribune of the subscription my folks ordered for me. Was kind of lost the months I was without the paper for it was my best means of keeping up with the news."

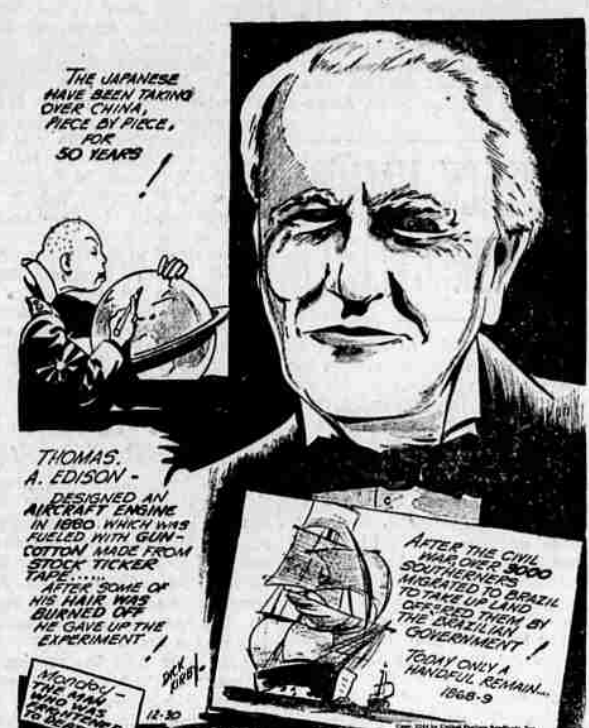

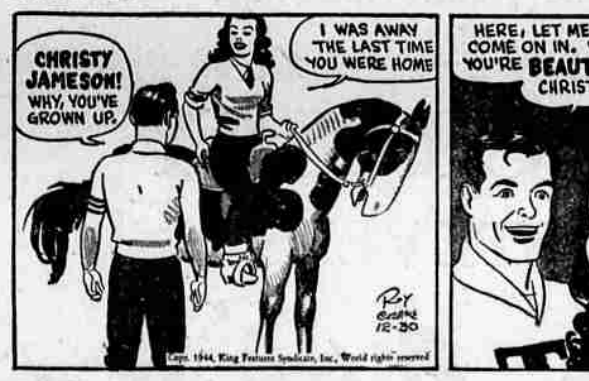

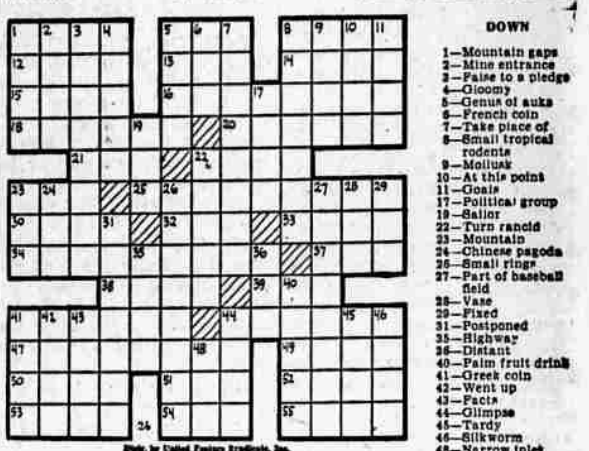
