NEMESIS OF JAP SHIPPING LOST

Washington, Jan. 2—(U.P.)—The navy today announced loss of the 1525-ton submarine Harder, nemesis of Japanese shipping since the early day of the war. Loss of three lesser craft also was disclosed.

The Harder, holder of a presidential unit citation for sinking thousands of tons of Japanese shipping, was the 35th U. S. submarine lost in this war. The other lost vessels were the landing craft LSM-018 and the motor torpedo boat, PT-300, which were last in the Philippines area, and the PT-311 which was destroyed in the Mediterranean area.

These losses raised to 243 the total of U. S. naval vessels lost from all causes in this war.

SHORTAGE HITS SHERIFF
