AFTER ALL, EVERYBODY IS A LITTLE CRAZY

Patient 33 years old. First doctor who examined her told her that her entire breast was cystic but that this was not uncommon. He advised her, however, to have the lump removed and let it go at that. She might have further trouble after the lump was removed, because of the cystic condition (cyst means bag or sac) and hence she must watch it carefully. Then he advised her to consult a surgeon immediately. (Mrs. M. M.)

Now, wait, Ma'am, I'm getting confused. Let's make a fresh start—a physician who found the breast had not only the lump the patient had discovered but several little cysts or sac-like lumps, and he persuaded the patient to have the advice of another physician who does surgery. Now take a full breath and go on from there.

... the surgeon recommended that the lump be removed at once. She accordingly submitted to the operation. At the operation the doctor found that the lump was not malignant, but there were so many cysts throughout the breast that they decided it was necessary to amputate the entire breast. Otherwise, they feared, the patient would have to have another operation before long, and would probably have to submit to amputation eventually. The report of the pathologist who examined the tissue specimen removed at the beginning of the operation was "chronic cystic mastitis". (That means chronic inflammation of the gland tissue in the breast or the portions which were cystic.)

Now the patient is mooning and complaining that she had expected to have only the lump removed—the lump she herself had discovered, and she has become morbid about it and keeps

reiterating that she doesn't believe it was really necessary to amputate the entire breast. . . . Well, that's my opinion, Ma'am. Every mother's son of us is a bit daft in one way or a few others, and some daughters, too.

It probably will not have any effect on the young woman's obsession what I may think or say about it, but you ask for my opinion and this is it. I think the young woman was fortunate in her choice of physicians. I believe both the first physician, who urged her to obtain the advice of the surgeon, and the surgeon who operated on her, gave her the best of treatment.

Not that radical surgery is advisable in every case of a lump in the breast. But in the case of this young woman it was surely wise. That's my opinion. No physician or surgeon could have done better.

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Cruelty to Children
My sister insists on taking her six months old baby to the movies once or twice a week. Is this harmful?

Answer—It is cruel, in my opinion. It subjects the baby to the unjustifiable risk of contracting some communicable disease such as infantile paralysis, flu, diphtheria, whooping cough.

Dampness
Here is a question that comes up frequently and we would appreciate your advice. Do you consider it to be very damp and not a healthy place to live? (S. E.)

Answer—No sale. On the other hand, in my opinion dampness has nothing to do with the healthiness of the place. Any region or place or building that is reasonably comfortable may be ideal so far as any one's notion of "dampness" is concerned. Nowhere in North America is the atmosphere too "damp" for healthy living, in my opinion. If in the back of your mind there are depressing notions about "rheumatism" and "taking cold" it might possibly cheer you up a bit to study "Call It Crip" and "The Ills Called Rheumatism"—for the former booklet includes twenty-five cents for the latter ten cents, and stamped envelope bearing your address. I do not guarantee to enlighten you—if you are past middle age the chances are your mind is no longer capable of taking new impressions.

The Dental Quack
I am 35 years old and a dentist tells me I have pyorrhea and he can cure it for \$150. He says three treatments will cure it and I will never have it again. He guarantees my gums will be just as healthy as yours. I would like to know your opinion. (Mrs. G. T. H.)

Answer—Any dentist, physician, surgeon or trick healer who promises "cures" or says he will cure anything in a matter of hours, or days, or in a guarantee to cure anything, is a "quack" and you should be careful. The present Medford tax levy is 17.7 mills on \$10,781,200 assessed valuation, which is equal to \$16.92 tax per capita based on the 1940 census, according to an annual state report released this week.

CITY'S TAX LEVY FOR OPERATION IS LOWEST IN STATE

Frank H. Rogers, city superintendent, in breaking down the report said, "This tax includes a special levy of 2.935 mills or \$31,250 for Medford's swimming pool reserve. Actual levy for the cost of city operations is \$159,204 or 14.765 mills which is the lowest levy in Oregon for cities of 5,000 or more population.

The cost per capita for city operations based on the 1940 census is \$14.11, Rogers stated, but based on the present estimated population of 15,000 would be \$10.81. The total cost of this year's levy which includes the special levy on the swimming pool and based on estimated present 15,000 population is \$10.62.

Pro Entertainers Sought for Draft
Washington, Jan. 6.—(U.P.)—Rep. Donald L. O'Toole, D., N. Y., today called for a drafting of all "4-F" actors, bandleaders and other professional entertainers" and suggested that they be assigned to entertainment units "which could be moved from battle front to battle front wherever morale was low."

O'Toole in a letter to War Mobilization Director James F. Byrnes said that "morale of G.I. Joe would be greatly raised if he saw these nationally known . . . entertainers serving in khaki or blue."

MEET CALLED OFF
Claremont, Calif., Jan. 6.—(U.P.)—The annual convention of the California Newspaper Publishers' association that was scheduled for February 23 and 24 at Fresno, has been cancelled.

INDUCTION NEAR FOR MEN 18 TO 37 WHO QUIT JOBS

Washington, Jan. 6.—(U.P.)—Selective service headquarters tonight ordered induction into the armed services, under drastically lower physical standards, of occupationally deferred registrants who change jobs without draft board consent.

The new regulations, covering men in the 18-through-37 age group, are effective immediately. They are designed to implement War Mobilization Director James F. Byrnes' recent plea for war workers to stay on their jobs.

Selective service headquarters said unapproved-job changers will be inducted on a regular quota basis. But it was understood that these quotas will be more or less for a formality and that actually all men reclassified as available for induction because they changed jobs without permission will be inducted.

Selective service tabulations based on Dec. 1 figures indicated there are approximately 5,100,000 holders of occupational deferments who would come under the controls of the new move.

It was understood that all men inducted because they changed jobs without permission would be taken into the army. They would be assigned to "military duty" rather than "general military duty," but there was no immediate definition of just what those duties would constitute.

MEDCO SAWMILL RESUMES MONDAY

The Medford Corporation's sawmill here which has been shut down since November 30 for the annual repair and overhaul period, will resume operation with both day and night shifts Monday.

In announcing the resumption, Auditor A. W. Lingaas of the corporation, revealed that last year's cut was the largest in the mill's history with output of 90,000,000 feet of lumber. This figure, according to Lingaas exceeded the next highest year, 1943, by ten million feet. All of the lumber for the two years has gone into the war effort.

With log prospects good for the balance of the winter and spring, the auditor asserted operations are expected to continue without interruption after Monday.

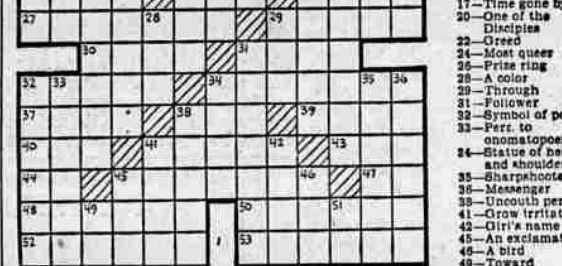
