**Nature Protects Life**  
Journal of the Wisconsin Naturopathic Association reports: "The human body is not constructed on a skimpy scale, physicians agree. Organs are bigger than necessary, some paired, so if one is crippled the other carries on. Humans are like nations with huge reserves with which to wage the war of daily living. The heart can do 13 times more work than it usually has to. One lung may be used, destroyed or collapsed, yet the other supports life. Two-thirds of each kidney may be destroyed; remaining tissues do their work. One-fifth of the pancreas is enough to supply the insulin needed. As much as 75% of the liver has been lost without causing death. Ten feet of the small intestine and much of the stomach have been removed without killing, and, according to psychologists, practically no one uses more than 25% of his brain."

**COURT MODIFIES TRUST ACCUSATION**  
Washington, Jan. 8.—(UP)—The supreme court today modified and affirmed in part a lower court antitrust ruling that seven glass container companies and 61 individuals had conspired to accomplish a monopoly of the industry.  
The 4 to 2 decision was written in a 35-page opinion by Justice Owen J. Roberts. Justices Hugo L. Black and Wiley B. Rutledge, dissented in part, but agreed with the court's findings of antitrust violations against the defendants. Justices William O. Douglas, Frank Murphy and Robert H. Jackson did not participate.

The antitrust proceeding was instituted in 1939 by the justice department. In October, 1943, the U. S. district court at Toledo, O., ruled that the firms had violated the antitrust laws through use of patent "pools" and machinery-leasing agreements which restrained interstate trade in glassware, machinery for the manufacture of glassware, and patents on the machinery.

**German Offense Failure Claims English Leader**

Somewhere in Belgium, Jan. 8.—(UP)—The German offensive in the Ardennes has ended in failure and the nazis armies that launched it three weeks ago are now being "written off" Field Marshal Sir Bernard L. Montgomery said Sunday in his first press conference since assuming command of the allied counter-attack in the north.  
Montgomery warned that the battle was far from over and that a great deal of hard fighting lay ahead, but he asserted that the Germans definitely have lost the initiative without gaining any important advantage from their initial successes.  
(Official statements earlier said German casualties approximated 100,000 killed, wounded or captured in the Ardennes, against considerably smaller American losses.)  
Lauds Eisenhower  
The colorful British leader paid high tribute to the allied teamwork and the valor of American fighting men that were combined at the critical moment to halt the nazis drive.  
He summoned American and British correspondents to his field headquarters to give them a detailed account of the battle since the German breakthrough, and then launched into an unexpected defense of his supreme commander, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.  
Montgomery hit particularly at sections of the British press which, he said, had been unjustly critical of Eisenhower's direction of the campaign.  
"Let me tell you that the captain of our team is Gen. Eisenhower," he said. "I am absolutely devoted to Ike. We are the greatest of friends... he bears a great burden, he needs our fullest support, and it is up to us to see that he gets it."

**Sloneker Starts 19th Year Service With Local Police**  
Patrolman Ray Sloneker of the Medford city police is starting on his 19th year of service on the force, having completed 18 years of service last Wednesday. Sloneker is out-ranked in service only by Joe Cave, assistant chief of police, who completed 23 years of service last August. Nearly up with Sloneker's record is Clatous McCredie, chief, who started with the department about a month later.  
Patrolman Sloneker is on the day shift and is a familiar figure, both at the desk in city police headquarters at the city hall and on the streets of Medford. The men of the department insist that a policeman's life is a very humdrum affair and that nothing exciting ever happens.
