

## NIGHT CLASS FOR NURSE AIDES TO OPEN JANUARY 15

Red Cross Committee Urges Women To Volunteer For Instruction, Vital Service

Red Cross volunteer nurses and committee announces that arrangements have been made for a night class, to be held at the Community hospital, 843 E. Main street, beginning January 15. Miss Betsy Rolland, R.N., the announcement continues, has been secured as instructor, having previously instructed volunteer nurses aides.

"Miss Rolland is associated with the Community hospital and the committee feels very fortunate to have her competent and inspiring instruction. This will be the only class open to registration this spring, and applicants are urged to telephone Red Cross 4405, any time during the period January 8 to 13, inclusive, and leave their names, address and telephone number, so that personal interview appointments may be made. Applicants who can do so are asked to meet committee representatives Wednesday, Jan. 10, from 4 to 6 p. m. at Red Cross headquarters in the courthouse for personal interviews.

**Must Be Over 18**  
"Any woman over 18 years of age in good health, with the equivalent of a high school education, is eligible as a volunteer nurse aide. It is particularly urged that housewives who would be free to give even a half day's service weekly consider entering this class, as the call from the local hospitals for volunteer nurses aides has increased and will become more and more urgent as registered nurses answer the immediate necessity of army service.

"There is a greatly increased opportunity for war time service in this vital field of assistant nursing. Nurse aides not only serve the war effort but also serve themselves in their homes by the development of new techniques and knowledge of nursing procedures. With the war at its present critical stage, and casualties mounting daily, every woman should ask herself seriously if she cannot give some time as a volunteer nurse aide.

"Although in this community alone 52 women have already graduated as volunteer nurse aides, not all of these were permanent residents, and at present both Sacred Heart hospital and Community hospital need more nurse aides than can be supplied. Business women who can give evening time and Sunday help, and housewives who can offer part time day duty are especially desired as nurses aides.

## DELIVERY OF MAIL TO NETHERLANDS TO START

Washington, Jan. 8—(U.P.)—Postal service between the United States and liberated areas of the Netherlands will begin a week from today. Postmaster General Frank C. Walker said the postoffice on January 15 will begin accepting non-illustrated postcards relating to business as well as personal matters but "limited to an exchange of information and ascertainment of facts." The postage rate will be three cents per card.

## LEGISLATORS IN CAUCUS AGREE ON SESSION LEADERS

Howard Belton to Head Senate — Marsh Speaker of House of Representatives

By Eric W. Allen, Jr. United Press Correspondent Salem, Ore., Jan. 8—(U.P.)—The 1945 Oregon legislature today convened its second war-

time session and 43rd regular meeting since attaining statehood, with formal election of officers and attaches.

The senate meeting was opened by Sen. William Strayer, Baker, "dean of the senate," while the house was called to order by Fred Drager, veteran chief clerk who retires after the first day after more than 30 years of service in that capacity.

**Unofficial Election**  
Preliminary organization was completed last night in pre-session caucuses with the "unofficial" election of presiding officers, clerks and minor officials.

Sen. Howard C. Belton, Canby, was unanimously elected president of the senate. No opposition was forthcoming as other prospective candidates for the post had all withdrawn in

his favor prior to the caucus. Rep. Eugene Marsh, McMinnville, was named without opposition to the speakership of the house of representatives. His election has been conceded for a number of months with sufficient votes pledged him by house members since about last June.

Both Belton and Marsh are Republicans, and will preside over dominantly Republican assemblies. In the senate, there are only five Democrats, while there are 25 Republicans. In the house the Republicans have a 50 to 10 majority.

**House Officials Named**  
Other posts of importance in both houses were determined at the caucuses. In the house, the assembly elected the following officials:  
Chief clerk — Claribel Buff,

previously stenographer to Fred Drager; assistant chief clerk—Patricia Sylvers, a veteran at the post; calendar clerk—Edith Bynon Low, who also has held the post previously; reading clerk—Richard Wilson, another veteran; sergeant at arms—Captain Dow Lovell, Salem, who recently returned from several years overseas with the 41st division; doorkeeper—Lee Howard; and mailing clerk—Vivien Ledoux. Only opposition vote was on the post of mailing clerk. Miss Ledoux won the post over M. T. Collins, who held it last year, by secret ballot in the smoke-filled caucus room.

At the senate caucus, the following clerks and other officials were named:  
Chief clerk — Mrs. Zylpha Burns, a veteran at the post, from Portland; assistant chief

clerk—Miss Genevieve Cooper, Portland; calendar clerk—Miss Pearl Schaeffer, Portland; reading clerk—Gordon Barnard, La Grande; sergeant at arms—Banks Mortimer, Portland; doorkeeper—Robert Campbell, Portland; and mailing clerk—William King, Prineville.

All the selections were unanimous with the exceptions of two, for assistant chief clerk and for doorkeeper Miss Cooper defeated Nettie Spaulding, Salem, by a 20 to 10 secret vote, for
