SYRETTES USED TO AID WOUNDED MADE FROM TIN

To impress residents of this area with the necessity of saving tin cans for salvage, members of the county salvage committee call attention to one little-known war-time use of tin, the making of "syrrettes."

Known to the army and navy as "angels of mercy," the syrettes are individual hypodermic syringes which are standard equipment in every first aid kit on the field of battle and are used to combat the excruciating pain and shock which follows a severe wound. It is said that since the effect of shock itself may be fatal, use of the syrette often means the difference between life and death.

The syrette is about the diameter of a lead pencil and resembles a small toothpaste tube with a needle at the head enclosed in a transparent plastic covering. Its pouch must be made of tin—100 per cent tin. If a soldier lies wounded and alone he opens his first-aid kit, takes out the syrette, pinches off the plastic covering, inserts the needle point under his skin and squeezes the little tin pouch. After a few minutes the morphine takes effect, his agony subsides and he is able to rest until the medical corps arrives.

Salvage experts say that it takes only two ordinary tin cans to produce tin for one syrette and everyone is asked to remember this and to save every possible can for the approaching drive, scheduled for early in March.
