

AMERICA URGED TO TAKE SHARE IN PEACE PLAN

If America doesn't become a member of the proposed United Nations organization, and assume her share of responsibility in solving social and economic problems and keeping the peace, a third world war is inevitable according to Mrs. Ralph Rasmussen, president of the Oregon League of Women Voters who spoke to league members last night at the Girls Community club. Mrs. Rasmussen explained in detail the proposals drafted at the Dumbarton Oaks conference and urged her listeners to write the president and secretary of state urging that its ratification be put before congress at once.

Provisions of the Dumbarton Oaks charter is to the effect that the United Nations organization would be headed by a general assembly, a policy making group after the order of the United States congress, with each member nation permitted one delegate. Other units would be a security council, charged with "keeping the peace problems" and empowered to deal swiftly with acts of aggression; an international court which would deal with problems of justice; a council to handle economic and social problems; a military council and a secretariat.

The security council would be made up of 11 persons, five to represent the five great powers and six chosen from smaller nations on a rotating system; would have the power to settle local disputes and advise non-members who presented problems, according to provisions of the charter. It would further have the power to impose quarantine restrictions on aggressors and resort to armed force if necessary.

According to the plan as outlined by Mrs. Rasmussen, the economic and social council would be made up of 18 members who would be outstanding authorities on international economic and social matters and would have a number of sub-commissions.

The organization's secretariat would probably be given diplomatic status and would be responsible only to the organization and not to their respective countries. The speaker said that of the 44 nations represented at Dumbarton Oaks, 90 per cent agreed with the general provisions of the charter and that seven nations had already ratified it.

Pointing out that the League of Women Voters had always believed "isolation neither practical or possible" and now considers the matter of stimulating public interest in the proposed United Nations organizations its most pressing work, second only to the actual war effort, Mrs. Rasmussen urged her listeners to bend every effort to the task.

Veteran Of Pacific Merchant Marine Is Visitor In Medford

Returning after 14 months of duty with a Merchant Marine force in the South Pacific, Alden Hibbert is visiting with his family on Crater Lake highway until January 25, when he will report for further duty at San Francisco.

He joined the Merchant Marine over three years ago and was awarded the Pacific war zone bar and the merchant marine combat bar for enemy action in the Halmahera islands on Morotal last October. U. S. forces invaded this group of

Netherlands East Indies islands September 15 with landings in the Halmahera group.

Claude Hibbert, who is in the navy, was visited by his brother, Alden Hibbert, recently in Tacoma enroute to Medford.

APOSTOLIC FAITH CHURCH TO HOLD REVIVAL MEETING

The Apostolic Faith, corner North Central avenue and Third street, Medford, will open an evangelistic campaign Sunday, Jan. 14, the Rev. C. W. Frost, pastor, announces. He and a number of local members attended midwinter meetings at the Portland headquarters returning to Medford after New Year's.

The campaign will be in charge of the Rev. R. Robert Crawford, general overseer from Portland, assisted by the Rev. Allan L. Crabtree of San Francisco, Mrs. Crawford, and a group of Portland workers and musicians. Dedicatory services for the new Wurlitzer organ just installed will start the special meetings.

Six years ago, about this time of year, a crew of more than 100 mechanics and helpers were building the Apostolic Faith church, which was dedicated February 25, 1938. A Hammond organ gave excellent service during these years, but when opportunity presented whereby a pipe organ could be purchased, the church group lost no time in securing it. This will augment the 27 piece orchestra which plays at all the services.

Mrs. Lena Ediger Wallace, who furnished music for the services at the church dedication will be in the evangelistic group at this time and will present a concert at the beginning of each evening service.

Rev. Crawford is well known in Medford, having carried on evangelistic campaigns here at various times since the work was established in 1917. Rev. Crabtree recently returned to San Francisco after holding special meetings in the midwest.

Definite details of the evangelistic campaign will be announced later.

Mrs. Flack Free After 9 Months

San Francisco, Jan. 10—(U.P.)—Mrs. Luise Flack, 28, convicted of manslaughter last March in connection with the death of her eight-year-old spastic daughter, was released from the county jail today after serving nine months of a one-year sentence.

Rent Tie-in Deals Placed Under Ban By Control Office

Washington, Jan. 10—(U.P.)—The office of price administration today moved to halt widespread evasion of rent price ceilings by banning all "tie-in" deals whereby a prospective tenant is required to buy furniture or other property before a landlord will rent to him.

OPA said nationwide reports showed frequent occurrences of this form of ceiling evasion, with landlords forcing tenants to pay as much as \$2,500 for furniture worth less than half the amount as a condition for renting an apartment or house.

In another action OPA ex-

empted rooms in bona fide clubs, college fraternities and sorority houses from rent control. The exemption applies only to clubs recognized as non-profit organizations by the bureau of internal revenue.

TWO TO PRISON

Grants Pass—Kenneth Russell was sentenced to one year in the state penitentiary, and his nephew, Delbert Russell, was sentenced to 18 months in the same institution, by Judge James W. Crawford, in circuit court on Monday. The Russells were both charged with the crime of larceny in a building, but the uncle, Kenneth Russell, received the lighter sentence as he did not leave the car while Delbert entered the Drolette Park Service station and took money from the cash register.
