ST. PETER'S SETS FUNDS ASIDE FOR CHURCH BUILDING
 At the annual meeting of St. Peter's Lutheran church on Portland avenue, last Sunday the treasurer, Ernest Mallama, reported that the congregation had over-subscribed its 1944 budget by more than \$1,000. This enabled the congregation to liquidate a debt of nearly \$1,500, the balance of the debt on January 1, 1944.
 In addition to wiping out the debt the congregation has raised a substantial sum for a building fund for a new church. A large per cent of the building fund has been invested in war bonds, the pastor, Harry H. Young, explained.
 In its meeting last Sunday the congregation voted its pastor a 50% increase in salary.
