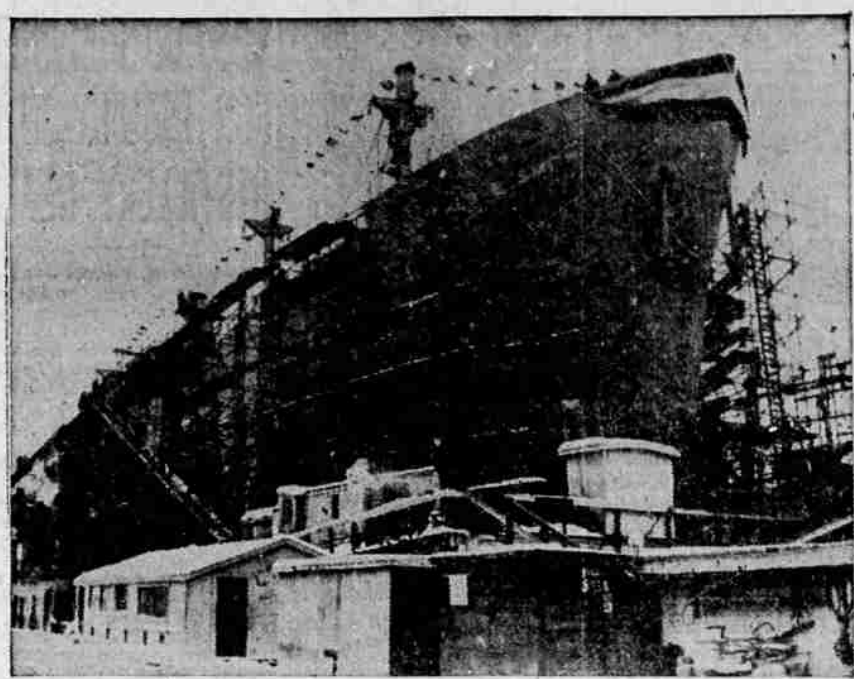

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CRIPPLED VETS
CHEER BUDDIES
BY ANTICS, TALK

Paris, Feb. 2.—(U.P.)—Staff Sgt. Fernand R. LeClaire rapped noisily on his artificial leg today and said "most bodies aren't worth more than 93 cents, chemically speaking—but this leg of mine is worth \$150."

It is jokes like that which have given LeClaire and his one-armed buddy, Cpl. Leland C. Grohman, top-billing as a morale building team in European army hospitals.

Cheer Patients Up
Their act begins when a LeClaire swings Grohman, a rugged boy from San Antonio, Tex., up on his shoulders and starts marching down a hospital corridor. They specialize in cheering up the legless or armless, and have just completed a circuit of army hospitals in Strasbourg, Nancy, Metz and Liege.

We wait four or five days after an amputation—that's when the brooding sets in," LeClaire of Willimantic, Conn., related. "Then we walk in on him just like ordinary G.I.s and start chatting about any old thing."

Patients Stunned
LeClaire said when the patient realized he was talking to "a pair of cripples" he was stunned. "Then he begins to perk up," LeClaire said. "He floods us with questions as to whether I can stand up all day, when he can expect to get his leg or arm, how he should break the news to his folks back home."

"Then to show him how well I can walk I pick up the heaviest man in the room and walk down the hall carrying him on my back."

"Next I tell them how I broke the news to my family—just wrote and told them I didn't feel bad about it and they shouldn't either," he said.

Pension Surprise
Grohman, who lost his left arm at Anzio, said many of the men are surprised to hear they will get pensions after the war. He said they were also amazed to learn he plans to return to his prewar job—driving a truck. LeClaire, who lost his leg in the jungles of New Georgia two

years ago, said the chief worry of most of the men was their job. Many are "haunted by memories of legless men selling apples on street corners," he said. "That's the only future they imagine for themselves."

Next in importance, he said, was how their wives would react. He said they felt reassured when he told them that in 17 months in amputation wards he knew of only one case where a wife left her husband after he returned and even in that case the couple was believed to have been reconciled later.
