ALLIED PATOLS ACTIVE UPON ALL ITALIAN FRONTS

Rome, Feb. 3 — (U.P.) — Al-
lied patrols have been active on
all sectors of the Italian battle-
front, allied headquarters an-
nounced today.

(The German communique
broadcast by Berlin radio re-
ported lively activity in the east-
ern Po valley where a German
assault party was said to have
blown up an Eighth army
stronghold southwest of the
Comacchio lagoon and captured
a number of prisoners.)
Mitchell medium bombers
reported good results in attacks

on a rail diversion bridge on the
Brenner Pass line at Chiasso-
forte. On another bridge at Tre-
viso in northeastern Italy and
on the Mantua Causeway bridge
in the Po valley.

Other B-27's of the tactical
air force struck at nine bridges
in northern Italy while P-51 Mus-
tangs of the 15th air force de-
stroyed eight enemy aircraft and
damaged three gun positions in
a strafing attack on the Karlovac
airfield in Yugoslavia. Balkan
air force Flaotigh joining in the
blows at Yugoslavia, swept over
the Zagreb and Maribor areas,
hitting road and rail traffic.
Troop columns and gun positions.
Seven allied planes were missing
from about 450 sorties.

JANUARY LACKED MISS BUNCH HAS SNOW, WITH RAIN MUCH TROUBLE ON TOTALLING 1.65 IN. METROPOLIS TRIP

Last month was unusual for
weather in that no snow fell,
the monthly survey of the
weather bureau at the airport
shows. Average snow fall for the
month is 3.3 inches, the records
show, over a period since 1911
when the bureau was establish-
ed. This average figure was con-
siderably raised by the extra
ordinary year of 1930 when 22.8
inches of snow fell during the
month of January.

Precipitation for the month
was 1.65 inches, .66 inches less
than the normal of 2.31 for this
month. Heaviest fall of the
month was .31 inches the night
of January 5 and the morning
of January 6.

Highest temperature of the
month was 56 degrees on Janu-
ary 13 and lowest was 20 de-
grees on January 28, the sur-
vey shows. This is somewhat
above normal, mean for the
month being 40.4 degrees as
against 37.9 degrees, the normal.

Seventeen days during the
month the temperature fell to
32 degrees or lower, five days
were clear, eight were partly
cloudy and 18 were cloudy. On
12 days there was a precipita-
tion of .01 inches or more and
heavy fog hung over the valley
for 14 days. On one day, Janu-
ary 18, hail fell.

Since the weather bureau
doesn't believe in such fantasies
as Ground Hog Day, the staff
seemed a little reluctant to com-
ment on whether the famous ani-
mal saw his shadow or not last
Friday. Officially, the records
show that the day was cloudy,
but since the sun did struggle
through once or twice, who
knows what the Ground Hog
saw?

TONGUE POINT TO GET NAVY SCHOOL

Astoria, Ore., Feb. 3 — (U.P.) —
The U. S. naval air station at
Tongue point will see the addi-
tion this month of a line main-
tenance training school for PBM
flying boats, Comdr. H. J. Mc-
Nulty, commanding officer, an-
nounced today.

About 1,000 enlisted men and
70 officers will be trained at the
school during the opening eight
weeks' period, as part of the
navy's air center program in
Chicago.

Men will be trained for serv-
ice and maintenance of the PBM
type of naval patrol plane, a
two-motored flying boat. The
instruction staff will be made
up of 23 officers and 225 en-
listed men.

LEGISLATURE TO EYE 80M. PROJECT

Salem, Ore., Feb. 3 — (U.P.) — An
\$80,000,000 reclamation project
for the Willamette valley is ex-
pected to go before the state leg-
islature for its approval in the
near future, after agreement by
members here yesterday on a
biennial plan of operation.

A series of dams, river bank
revetments and channel im-
provements for irrigation, nav-
igation, power and drainage
purposes are included in the project,
which would be partially paid
for by federal government funds
already appropriated for the
work.
