## SALEM VIKINGS, TORNADO READY FOR HOOP TILT

Capital City Five Said Better Than In Early Season Tilts With Medford

Medford high school's Black Tornado basketball crew is all primed for their clash with Salem Vikings on the local hardwoods tonight, beginning at 8 o'clock. The Tornado came through their lop-sided conquest of Bend last week-end in grand shape and Coach Al Simpson announced today they are ready for their third meeting with Salem this season. Medford won the two previous encounters played at Salem December 29 and 30.

According to the grapevine, Salem has shown considerable improvement since their early season mixes with the Tornado and has beaten several of the upstate teams recently. The Vikings use a three-two zone defense and will present the same lineup here as faced the Tornado at Salem, according to word received here. The Vikings lineup will probably consist of Bellinger and Fitzmaurice at forwards, Chamberlain center, and Bordman and Lowe at the guard positions. Medford will start off with their regular lineup of Hayes and Ross at forwards, Riggs at center and Fawcett and Watson at guards.

This will be a tuncup game for the bitter week-end series with Klamath Falls Pelicans, who have also fallen twice before the Tornado, in a pair of southern Oregon conference clashes on the Medford high maple boards.

Ashland travels to Grants Pass tonight for a southern Oregon conference tilt and the Cavemen return the visit when they go to Ashland Friday night. Medford also faces a heavy schedule next week when they

face Grants Pass there Tuesday night and Ashland there Friday and here Saturday. The district tournament is slated for the Southern Oregon College of Education gym in Ashland February 23 and 24.

Ray Henderson's eighth grade team will play Ashland eighth graders in the preliminary, beginning at 7 o'clock. They have met three times with Medford winning two and Ashland one. If Henderson's team can win tonight it will clinch the southern Oregon eighth grade championship but an Ashland win will throw it into a tie.

### Rogue Fish Bill Finds Objection In G. Pass Area

Grants Pass, Feb. 6—Objection to house bill No. 269, introduced in the legislature by Rep. W. W. Balderree of Grants Pass, to prevent fishing with hook and line from a boat or any floating device in the section of the river between Innes riffle, about two miles this side of Galice, to Bailey creek, six or seven miles further down the river, was voiced today by local fishing enthusiasts who pointed out that the bill would deprive residents along that stretch of the river of the privilege of fishing from an anchored boat or a salmon board.

It was said the bill, as drawn, preventing fishing from a floating device or boat between July 1 and the end of the fishing season, would favor a group of visiting fishermen who come in for about 30 days for shore fishing along that stretch of river. Hearing on the bill is scheduled for Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at Salem.

### MOSCONI'S LEAD SOARS IN BILLIARD TOURNAMENT

Boston, Feb. 6—(U.P.)—Joseph A. Coletti, noted sculptor and former associate of the late artist, John Singer Sargent, today listed his choices as the ten most beautiful women in America as follows:

1. Hedy Lamarr—"a real beauty, enchanting, unique and completely ravishing."
2. Greer Garson—who typifies the "essence of aristocratic charm and dignity."
3. Ingrid Bergman—"a marvelous figure from a sculptor's viewpoint with an extraordinary mouth."
4. Greta Garbo—whose beauty is "elusive, making her eyes hauntingly unforgettable."
5. Katharine Cornell—who possesses a "tremendous appeal though it is likely to appeal to the artist rather than the layman."
6. Vivian Leigh—the "little English girl with a winsome allure."
7. Ethel Barrymore—a great actress "beautiful in the classic tradition whose head rather reminds me of the Hermes by Praxiteles."
8. Madame Chiang Kai-Shek—

for the "loveliness of the orient."  
9. Esther Williams—"whose clean-lined appeal represents the best of the American athletic type."

10. Madeleine Carroll—"a perfectly natural beauty with marvelous shoulders and a lovely carriage."

Coletti, who lives in Quincy, explained that Madame Chiang, though not an American, was included on his list because she was educated in the United States and had retained her association with this nation.

He said U. S. Rep. Clare Boothe Luce, R., Conn., just missed a place among the ten, but added that the secret of her attractiveness was in her chic dress. The dutchess of Windsor, he said, fell into the same category.
