THE GLAMOUR OF SPECIALISM

Our five-year-old son has rheumatic heart disease with dilatation and some other things, according to our doctor. We are prompted to write you after reading that you advocate mild exercise as against our present plan of absolute rest in bed all of the time. The doctor first heard a murmur two months ago. Then a pediatrician examined the boy a month later and said he suspected rheumatic fever. He recommended extra rest but no other change. Examination by heart specialist showed rheumatic heart disease, etc. Treatment, rest in bed all the time, never on feet, 3 to 10 aspirin tablets per day. Now the youngster is most energetic and sometimes it is almost impossible to keep him quiet, and when he does become active he is soon puffing and breathing as hard as if he had gone ten rounds. We would like to obtain another opinion and diagnosis, perhaps from a doctor who might prescribe different treatment. Can you recommend a good heart specialist in (W.C.W.)

fully confirmed the family doctor's diagnosis — which means merely that two doctors agreed. But still the parents yearned for more glamour, and they found it in the form of the heart doctor. What amazes me is that the heart specialist or even a good family physician would feed a child aspirin in the amount the correspondent mentions. Large doses of aspirin produce weakness of the heart, depression of the respiratory and vasoconstrictor centers, albumin and casts in the urine and collapse. Many persons have an idiosyncrasy for aspirin and even an ordinary dose in such persons may cause feelings of weakness, collapse, angioneurotic (giant hive) swellings of face and throat, skin rashes, hives, and rarely death. Aside from relieving ache or pain — for which aspirin is one of the least dangerous agents we have — there is no satisfactory evidence that aspirin has any curative or palliative value in rheumatic heart disease or rheumatic fever (acute infectious arthritis, acute inflammatory rheumatism). In view of the depression of the respiratory center produced by aspirin perhaps the labored breathing of this child is attributable to the treatment as much as to the heart disease.

BOY SCOUT WEEK WILL BE MARKED THROUGHOUT U. S.

With "Scouts of the World—Brothers Together" as their theme, Boy Scouts, Cubs, Senior Scouts and their adult leaders throughout the United States will commemorate Boy Scout week which begins Thursday and continues through Wednesday, Feb. 14. The theme was selected for this Boy Scout week celebration as well as the rest of the year because there are unmistakable evidences that in this year Scouting will find its rebirth in nation after nation, as fast as the forces of freedom liberate them. Membership in the 48 Boy Scout associations in 70 different lands around the world at the outbreak of World War II in 1939 was over the three million mark. Mussolini abolished the Boy scout movement in Italy. There never has been Boy Scouting in Germany. Hitler abolished Scouting in each country invaded but there is ample evidence that in many war-torn countries Scouting went underground and managed to keep the spirit of Scouting alive. In Japan the movement was militarized. During Boy Scout week Scouts will take over scores of store windows to display some

of their handicraft and to demonstrate some of the skills they acquire through the program. Investiture ceremonies during the week will bring hundreds of new boys into the ranks of Scouting. Scouts will rededicate themselves to the Scout oath and on February 8, which is the actual anniversary day of the original incorporation of the movement at Washington, D. C. Sunday, Feb. 11, is Boy Scout Sunday and Cubs, Boy Scouts, Senior Scouts and their leaders will attend church services in uniform.
