Oliver Barber's Observations
No matter how defiantly you state that you don't care what people think of you, down in your heart you do care. So do I. It is because I value the good opinion of friends that it bothers me when they rather openly disapprove the casual acquaintanceships I make. When it turned out the woman I met in a store and wound up by being invited to her home, was a fairly well known business executive, why that was all right. But when a bar tender and I, taking coffee at the same lunch counter, exchanged our life histories, well that was a horse of a different color.

Yet the bar tender had been a major in the last war and the commanding officer of the regiment in which his son now serves was his commanding officer. He showed me a letter the C.O. had written, praising his son. In the officer's uniform the bar tender once had worn, he would have been very acceptable and meeting him in this informal manner would have been considered more or less of an adventure.

For one who has my insatiable appetite for people, the city provides an unending feast. Yet when out with friends, I must starve, whatever the banquet spread before me. You don't talk with a Negro sailor one minute, a milk-coated matron waiting to cross the street the next, followed by a chat with very fishy fishermen—or a colonel or a patently "soldered dove." No, you just ignore all these riches in personalities, do your errands and go home. Which I do when friends, or members of the family, are along; which I do not if I'm alone.

It was when I was alone that I got into conversation with a young man who is studying art. He showed me some sketches of city life he'd made during the past week. I suppose they were good; I wouldn't know, really art being more or less of a blind spot with me.

And then he showed me a picture done in oils. In the foreground were red and orange houses. Most painful! He explained, "These blobs of atrocious green are hints of trees. They, with the orange and red houses are to contrast, and draw attention to the lovely cloud you see in the background. Out of sheer relief, people will look at the cloud. Which is what I intended they should do. You get the point, don't you?"

"I see the cloud, if that's what you mean," I replied. But if that's a modern way of hijacking art appreciation, I don't think so much of it. Nevertheless the artist had contributed his bit to the interesting personalities I'll like to remember when life goes back to normal and I'm once again limited to chickens and carrots.
