The accident caused damage to both cars, estimated at several hundred dollars, in a report filed later. Russell P. Jensen, a sailor, of Route 1, Box 231, was driving the other car and Willa Mae Tower, a passenger sustained a sprained left shoulder, according to statements made in an accident report. Another passenger reportedly in a dazed condition after the collision was escorted to his home by police officers, the department said.

Officers investigating the scene of the accident reported the Jensen car had also struck a tree about 50 feet from the point of impact with the Sletten car and rolled over, coming to rest about 30 feet farther down the street.

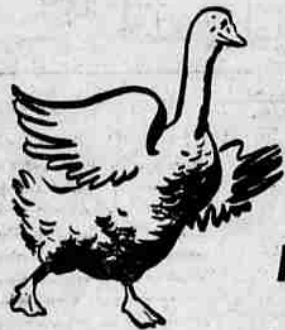
