

GERMANS MOVING PRISONERS FROM EASTERN SECTOR

Washington, Feb. 14—(U.P.)—The Germans are moving all of their war prisoners to interior points west of the Oder river, the state and war departments announced today.

The announcement said that American prisoners formerly held in eastern Germany are being relocated, but relatives should address mail to their last known addresses pending further information.

Camps being moved or already moved were in east Prussia, Poland and that part of the German province of Pomerania east of the Oder. They included Stalag Luft IV, Stalag II A, Stalag II B, Stalag III B, and Stalag III C.

Prisoners in Stalag Luft III, the announcement said, are being moved to the southwest. Those in northern Silesia are being taken to the northwest. Prisoners in southern Silesia are being moved southwest across Bohemia.

Among those being transported to the southwest, the announcement said, are Americans who were in Stalag VII B and Stalag 344. Officers from Oflog 64 are being sent to Stalag III A at Luckenwalde, between Berlin and Leipzig.

"The destination of the other prisoners has not been confirmed," the announcement said. "Information concerning the relocation of prisoner of war camps is constantly being received."

FAG SHORTAGE TO GROW WORSE

Washington, Feb. 14—(U.P.)—The cigarette shortage will probably grow worse during 1945 and about the only thing that can be done about it is to see that available smokes are spread around.

The Federal Trade Commission arrived at that conclusion today after an extensive investigation. It reported its findings to Chairman Burton K. Wheeler, D., Mont., of the Senate Interstate Commerce Committee who requested the inquiry.

Wheeler told the FTC he had received complaints from retailers who were unable to get cigarettes to supply their customers. He asked the FTC to see if the shortage was artificial, or if any laws were being violated in the distribution of cigarettes.

No, the FTC said, the shortage is "directly traceable" to the huge numbers of cigarettes going to the armed forces and to America's Allies. This big drain on supplies, it added, was "magnified" by increased smoking here at home due to bigger incomes, to "overbuying" by people afraid of getting caught short, and to increased nervous tension.

GIRLS WHO AIDED NAZIS SENTENCED

Bay City, Mich., Feb. 14—(U.P.)—Gum-chewing Kitty Marie Case, 21, and Shirley Jean Druce, 18, Owosso girls convicted of helping two young German prisoners of war to escape last summer, today were sentenced to prison terms by Federal Judge Frank Picard.

Miss Case, plump, and bobby-soxed was given 15 months; Miss Druce, smaller and dark-haired, a year and a day.

Picard lectured the tense-faced girls severely before passing sentence. The army, Shiawassee county and Owosso officials and the general public's "misplaced humane thoughts" were included in his censure.

Picard blamed the army for its laxity in guarding the Germans, Gottfried Habel and Erit Classen, fellow-employees of the girls at the W. R. Roach Canning Co., who managed many illicit dates with the girls before the escape in an automobile furnished by them.
